WOMAN FIGURED IN DESERT DUEL ENDING IN DEATH

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Nov. 10.—(A. P.)—Water, whiskey or a woman probably figured prominently in the "bad lands" shooting in which Bill Robinson and Mat Burts were killed last Sunday at Government Holes, an isolated watering place east of here and near the Nevada line.

Such was the belief of sheriff's deputies who today continued their investigation of the gun fight on the theory that it was another one of those duels which occasionally remind authorities that the wild days of the west have not vanished in that section northwest of Needles known as the Ivanpah range.

Robinson was foreman of the Rock Springs Cattle company which controls most of the water holes on the range. Burts was a former employee of the company, a "two gun" man imported from Arizona six years ago to help wage war on cattle rustlers who were terrorizing the country.

It was two years ago that Burts lost his job with the Rock Springs outfit and since then, investigators allege, he had been suspected of a connection with various liquor troubles in the district and with a series of shootings which are said to have frightened several of Robinson's predecessors off the range.

Robinson came to the district several months ago, heralded as a man who "wouldn't use his boots for punning." Bad blood between him and Burts soon was evident, according to deputies and the theory tentatively accepted is that the two men met to settle some quarrel over water rights on the range or over liquor transactions or over a woman. A woman is reported to have accompanied Burts on his one way trip to Government Holes.

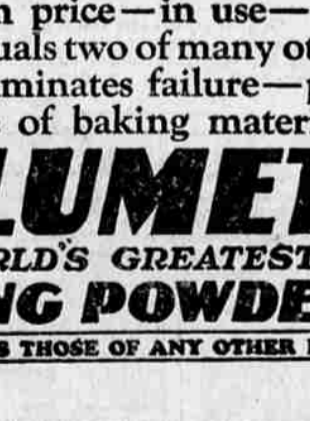
