

### HUNTLEY MURDER TRIAL IS STARTED, OFFICERS TESTIFY

Hearing of testimony in the trial of Hyman Huntley, 53, charged with first degree murder, began in the circuit court Monday afternoon after Bert H. Smith of Ashland had been selected to fill the vacancy caused by the illness of A. R. Brown of Ashland. Huntley is accused of mortally stabbing his brother-in-law, Jesse James Gibbs, 28, in a quarrel on the night of September 2 over the alleged attention paid by Gibbs to Mrs. Huntley.

It is assumed from the questions asked jurors that the defense will plead self-defense.

Up to noon today four witnesses had been called by the state. They were City Policemen Joe Cave, Legett and Sundermann and Sheriff Jennings. The officers testified to the surrender of Huntley following the fatal affray, and conditions at the Huntley home following the tragedy, whence they went to investigate.

Other witnesses scheduled to take the stand today for the state are Coroner Conger, who took charge of the body after the fight and conducted the inquest, and physicians called by neighbors and the police to aid Gibbs.

The courtroom at the morning session was packed, including a number from Douglas and Coos counties, friends of the defendant and Gibbs. There will be no hearing of the case tomorrow on account of Armistice day. The state is expected to close its case by Friday. Twenty-five witnesses have been called by the defense.

It has an observation platform, furnished with lounge chairs.

The locomotive and car has U. S. truck tires and burns Shell gasoline. The train left this morning to continue its trip to Los Angeles from New York.

The three officials will arrive this evening, and are acceptable to Ashland, who balked at southern Oregon selections.

The Medford team line-up will probably be as follows: Hughes, center; Neff and Jackson, guards; Morgan and Hubbard, tackles; Singler and Sanders, ends; Herriot, quarterback; Moore and Conrad, halfbacks, and Denn, fullback. Reserve back-field men will be Arthur Dunn and Williams. Reserve linesmen, Putney, Zeck and Green.

This afternoon and evening the local high school will hold a bonfire and rally and serpentine, with talks by citizens and players. The team finished hard work for the game last night, with a scrimmage and skull practice.

Between halves, the De Molay team of this city will evolve, and the rooting sections of both schools serpentine. The high school band under the direction of F. Wilson Waite will furnish the music.

The game starts at 2:30 o'clock, and cloudy weather is the prediction.

### ANOTHER REVOLT ON IN NICARAGUA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—(A. P.)—Private advices received here indicate that revolutionary activity has again broken out in Nicaragua.

Dr. Juan Baupista Scausa, the vice president of Nicaragua, a liberal in politics and opposed to General Chamorro, the leader of the recent revolution, has arrived at Launion Salvador.

Other reports say the conservative troops directed by General Chamorro's lieutenant have taken control of Leon, the liberal stronghold and the residence of Dr. Scausa.

It was said here that Dr. Scausa's flight indicates he intends to assume the presidency if President Solorzano resigns at the convening of congress in December.

### FAMOUS PILSEN BREWERIES QUIT

PILSEN, Czechoslovakia, Nov. 10.—(A. P.)—Two of the celebrated breweries which produced the beverages which spread the name of Pilsen throughout the world, have been compelled to close because of the decrease in demand for beer and the rising cost of operating.

The depression in the brewing trade is not confined to Pilsen alone, for in the last few weeks 20 breweries in Bohemia have ceased operations.

Gates to Bell field were guarded but those who saw the practice expect some real action Saturday from some of the stuff the Aggies are preparing for the game with Oregon at Eugene.

### 12-YEAR OLD GIRL ANSWERS CRITICS WHO DOUBT GENIUS

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—(A. P.)—In proceedings attributed by associates to unwarranted doubts of her ability, a new guardian has been appointed for Nathalia Crane, twelve year old Brooklyn poetess, who has published three volumes and gained world wide recognition as a prodigy.

Edward J. Flanagan, a Brooklyn lawyer, was announced special guardian yesterday on representation in surrogate court that her father, Clarence P. Crane, who was appointed her guardian in April, 1924, had failed to make an accounting for more than \$5000 royalties, although two volumes have run into large sales here and abroad.

"This move in court," her father said, "followed the visit to our home of two Brooklyn newspaper women. One of the women waved one of Nathalia's books in her face and challenged her authorship of it, declaring a child of her age could not have written it, and demanded to know who had written it. Nathalia made this reply:

"I do write my poems, every word of them and when I don't know a word I want, I look it up."

Thomas Seltzer, publisher of the poems, scoffed at doubts upon the authorship.

"I am ready to swear," he said "that Nathalia's work is just as much her own authorship as the poems credited to Byron are his. Many of Byron's poems were written when he was very young."

Nathalia's first two volumes, "The Janitor's Boy" and "Lava Lane," have puzzled educators, psychologists and publishers by the profound knowledge of human nature shown in them.

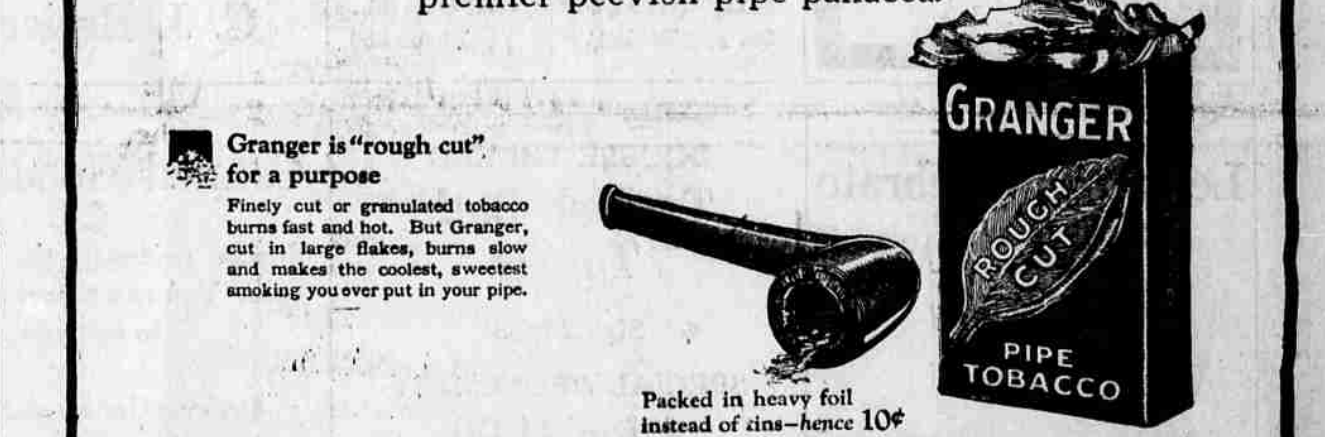
