NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—Benny Leonard, less than a year after retiring as lightweight boxing champion of the world, yearns for a fight, by his own admission, but the objections of his mother have not been overcome.

Leonard told of his desire to don gloves while going through light training in a gymnasium and his refusal became almost a probability when it was learned he had communicated with the state athletic commission.

Tex Rickard, promoter, admitted that he was considering the retired champion as a principal in matches this winter.

"And there is the prospect which has often been mentioned," Rickard added, "that he will face Mickey Walker for the welterweight championship next summer. You know Leonard will have to re-enter the ring as a writer, as I don't think he can make 125 pounds. There will be plenty of opponents for him and he is a favorite with the public."

"I may get in a punch or two next summer," Benny said. "Sure I want to fight again. I have been feeling like returning to the ring for some time. Perhaps if I can prevail on my mother, who doesn't want me to fight, I will be among those present next summer."

**FOOTBALL POPULAR HAWAIIAN ISLES**

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov.—Football has staged its longest and most western outpost—Hawaii.

In the islands, where heretofore only ordinary interest has been manifested, the sport has penetrated to virtually every point. The thump of the pilskin will resound across 2100 miles of the Pacific this year through three college teams journeying from the United States to take on the pick of the islands at Honolulu.

Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 118 General Laws of Oregon, 1921, notice is hereby given that the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, will meet in the Circuit Court Room of the County of Jackson County, Oregon, on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1925, at the hour of 1:00 o'clock P. M. of said day, and at the said time and place opportunity will be given for a full and complete discussion of the estimate of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year, as published herewith, by any taxpayer subject to such tax levy when made, in favor of or against any of the proposed tax levies herein as the County Court may deem for the best interests of Jackson County.
