

### OCTOBER A VERY DRY MONTH, ONLY ONE RAINY DAY

Last month was an exceedingly dry one in Medford and the valley, having a precipitation of only .25 of an inch, whereas the average rainfall for that month is .37 of an inch, but the present month bids fair to make up for this deficiency, as so far its rainfall is .68 of an inch, and it is still raining.

Also the temperature of October with a mean of 51.72 was much over a degree colder than the month's average mean temperature of 53.1.

In fact the total rain of October all came in one day, amounting to .29 of an inch. Thirteen days of the month were clear, 12 were cloudy and 6 partly cloudy. There was no snowfall during the month, nor any so-called killing frosts.

The maximum temperature of October was 81, on the 21st, and the minimum was 29 on the 30th. Other temperatures were as follows: Mean maximum 68.77; mean minimum, 34.67; mean, 51.72; and greatest daily range, 47.

Northbound passenger train No. 11, due here at 2:30 a. m., was delayed over five hours because of a southbound freight train derailment near Gold Ray at 1 o'clock this morning, involving five loaded box cars. While two cars rolled down a steep embankment near the edge of Rogue River and three were pushed in a crosswise position on the track north of the train crew was injured. The track was cleared for through travel about 5:30. Two cars loaded with veneer panel that left the track, have not been recovered, according to late reports.

### SPECIAL EXPRESS RATE FOR MIXED SHIPMENT

The freight rate committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce has secured the granting by the American Express company, it was announced today by Secretary Boyd of the Chamber of Commerce, of a special express rate effective December 5, next, whereby the shipment of dried prunes, nuts, apples and canned goods will be allowed in one package at the lowest express rate.

"There are some stores," said Secretary Boyd, "and many individuals who will be glad to know of this, as it has been difficult in the past to send a combined package to eastern friends under the old rulings and we think this will greatly aid in putting these specialized products in the hands of many consumers in the big markets."
