## GOVT. URGED TO REDUCE ST. PAUL INTEREST RATE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—A bill and argument to be put before the coming session of congress urging that railroads in financial difficulties which owe money to the government be allowed a reduction in interest from six to four or 4 1/2 per cent was made public today by the Railroad Owners' association. The case of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, now in receivership, was cited especially as one in which the government should reduce its exactions since the road owes the government \$55,000,000.

A reduction, the argument contended, would facilitate early termination of this receivership. The association was said to represent "many thousands of stockholders throughout the country, and approximately \$1,000,000 of stock ownership."

The government was largely responsible for the situation in which the railroads became its debtors, it asserted.

## RED GRANGE GETS STELLAR POST IN FOOTBALL WORLD

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—Seldom in the course of the hectic campaigns in modern sports is it as easy to pick out and label the outstanding heroes as in 1925. Red Grange, for instance, stands alone on the gridiron pedestal. It is a source of regret that the death of Walter Camp prevents Grange from joining the select circle of stars who have gained a place on the late Yale critic's all-American selections three years in a row.

Paavo Nurmi stands out among track and field athletes, while Big Bill Tilden and Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen dominate the tennis world and Rogers Hornsby looms large in the major league baseball field.

In golf Joyce Wethered, the British star, likewise tops the women's golf list. Few will question the top ranking position of Bobby Jones.

The list of backfield aces led by Red Grange presents an unusually difficult problem this fall in making all-American or even all-sectional teams. Probably the middle west would agree generally upon Grange, Kutsch and Friedman for three of its all-star backfield, but Molenda of Michigan, Marek of Ohio State, McCarty of Chicago and Baker of Northwestern would demand consideration in picking the fourth attacking weapon.

Tryon of Colgate, Oberlander of Dartmouth and Kreuz of Penn would be hard to keep off any eastern backfield array with Bunnell of Yale or Pease of Columbia among the outstanding candidates as quarterbacks.

## Cornerstone Klamath Vet Hospital Is Laid

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 12.—The cornerstone of the new veteran's memorial hospital was laid here yesterday with appropriate ceremonies by the American Legion post. George Griffith of Salem, past state commander of the legion, was the principal speaker. The building is being erected to the memory of World War veterans by the people of Klamath county.

## WIFE OF LONDON MAYOR HAS EASY POLITICAL JOB

LONDON.—Women's suffrage is about 100 per cent in effect in the office of Sir William Pryke, Lord Mayor elect. During the 12 months of her husband's reign Lady Pryke can live at the Mansion House or not as she likes, although her husband is obliged to do so. She may accompany her husband to all functions, is presented at court and is entitled to present members of her own family. She has the privilege of an enormous new in Saint Paul's Cathedral capable of holding 25 persons, and no one may enter it without her permission, not even the Lord Mayor. She may appoint maids of honor at the Lord Mayor's banquet and accompany the Lord Mayor on the bench when he presides as chief magistrate.

On leaving the mansion house at the expiration of the lord mayor's year of office, the lady mayoress receives a present of jewelry from the city fathers.

## VOLCANO IS BLAMED FOR ALASKA WEATHER

ANCHORAGE, Alaska.—Mount Shishaldin, a volcano on Unimak island of the Aleutian archipelago is blamed for the unusual weather which is prevailing. Shishaldin was reported to have been active last week. Rivers remain open and the whole landscape is green. Mountains usually covered with snow at this season are bare and prospectors in remote sections are held up by the open weather.

## German Note Satisfactory.

PARIS, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—The Cologne zone will be evacuated December 1. It is taken for granted in official circles, the German note on disarmament having been found satisfactory to the point that no further obstacles are anticipated.

## MURDERER CLAIMS HE KILLED FOE AS ACT OF KINDNESS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—Because the victim asked him to do it as a favor, Joseph A. Pickard, 25, told the police, he shot and killed Joseph F. Stein, 45, here last night as a quietly arranged act of kindness. "I did it because I hated to see him live when he wanted to die," was Pickard's plea when held on a murder charge after confessing to the police that he shot Stein in his room in the basement of a hospital where both worked as window washers. Pickard said Stein wanted to die because he had "ruined his life," but other employees at the hospital said there had been ill feeling between the two men because Pickard had made accusations against Stein's character. He is alleged to have continually chided Stein for living under the onus of his accusations.

## FARM CONDITIONS REPORTED GOOD

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Commissioner Cooper of the farm loan board, who has just returned from a tour of inspection of the various sections covered by the reserve land banks, views agricultural conditions throughout the country as "in the main, satisfactory."

The commissioner issued a statement giving in some detail his first hand observation of conditions in the various sections.

"I should say in the New England district they are generally satisfactory," the statement said. "The same would be true of the districts embracing the two Virginias, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee—although serious drought results were reported in some sections of Virginia and in some parts of Tennessee."

In the Spokane district—Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon—crop conditions generally were good, except some local drought; unseason-

able late rains interfering with threshing and possibly causing some loss to unthreshed wheat in Montana. The Berkeley district—California, Utah, Nevada and Arizona—reported conditions generally satisfactory.

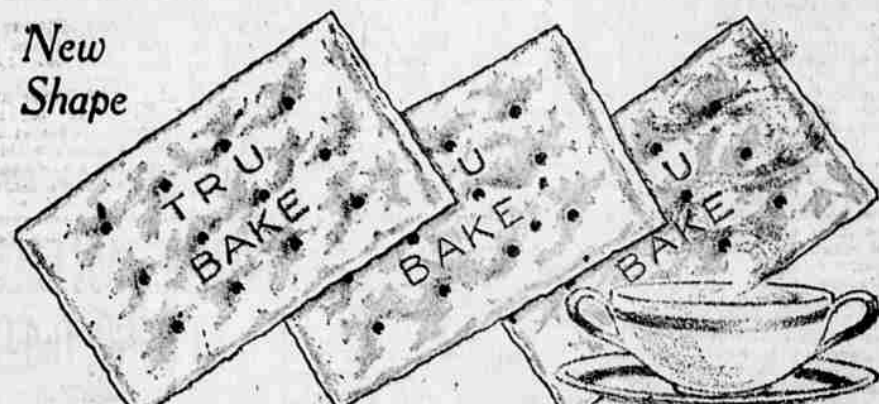
