

EARTH TREMORS IN CALIFORNIA CAUSE ALARM

Residents of Anaheim Awakened By Severe Earthquake Shocks—Manila Is Badly Shaken—Disturbances Registered at Washington.

ANAHEIM, Cal., Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—Earth tremors of sufficient force to awaken many residents, were felt here at three o'clock this morning.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—A serious earthquake apparently centering at a great distance from Washington left its record today on the seismographs of Georgetown university. It began at 6:12 a. m. eastern time, and still was in progress at 9:40 a. m. Father Tomdorff, in charge of the instruments, described the shock as "very severe."

MANILA, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—A strong earthquake occurred at 8:15

tonight. The tremors continued for a half hour. The center of the disturbance was estimated to be 300 miles from Manila. No damage was reported, although buildings in Manila were shaken perceptibly.

Allowing for difference in time, the serious earthquake recorded today on the seismograph at Georgetown university was the identical one felt at Manila at 8:15 tonight. Manila is thirteen hours ahead of Washington in time.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—An earthquake about half the intensity that devastated Tokyo and Yokohama, September 1, 1923, was registered at the Gonzales heights observatory here today. The indicated center was 5300 miles away in the direction of Formosa.

The Noted Dead

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—(A. P.)—Robert B. Wrenn, 53, famous tennis player and all-around athlete is dead. National champion for four years, a second baseman and a quarterback at Harvard, a Roosevelt Rough Rider during the Spanish war, a major in the air service during the World war, he died last night in his apartment here of Bright's disease. For 25 years he had been a member of the New York stock exchange.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Nov. 12.—Edward Drummond Libbey, millionaire glass manufacturer and internationally

known art connoisseur, died at his home shortly after nine o'clock this morning. Stricken Sunday with pneumonia, Mr. Libbey showed little resistance to the ravages of the disease. Mr. Libbey spent his summers in Europe and his winters in California. He recently gave the Toledo museum of art more than \$1,000,000.

Friends telephoned her house, because of her non-arrival, they received no answer. Sounds which might have been pistol shots were heard between 1 and 2 o'clock by a nearby neighbor, but who, because of entertaining company, failed to regard the sounds as of any special significance.

As usual yesterday, Mr. Neil came for lunch from the Ashland Creamery, where he is employed. The only thing out of the ordinary at the luncheon, he said, was the fact that Jillson, who had been a boarder with the Neils for five or more years, did not eat. Mr. Neil left the house at 12:45 to return to his duties and shortly after 4 o'clock was told the tragic news. Last evening he was on the verge of collapse and is under the doctor's care today.

For years Ray Jillson had been a friend of the Neils according to friends and relatives of the family. He had been a ranch hand for Mr. Neil when he operated a ranch in the Dead Indian country over 19 years ago. When they moved to Ashland, Jillson became their board-

er. Trouble was a thing that is said never to have been experienced before between him and the family and in addition he was devoted to the children, of which Mr. and Mrs. Neil had three. In fact, Mrs. Neil, according to an aunt, "did much for him, did him many favors and this is what she got."

Jillson had a general reputation of being a law abiding citizen. He was a night clerk at the Southern Pacific railroad depot at Ashland and has a father and mother, together with other relatives living in that city.

Several letters in his personal effects found in his room may lead to throwing new light on the motives for the crime.

Mrs. Neil, whose maiden name was Clara M. Loomley, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Loomley of Klamath Falls, well-known Klamath county residents. They arrived in Ashland last evening for a visit with their daughter, entirely ignorant of the tragedy, until their arrival. Mrs. Neil was a member of several lodges and was an officer of the Eastern Star. She is said to have been an accomplished musician and often young folks organized in orchestras or otherwise, came to her house to practice. She was born in Klamath county and in her immediate family leaves her husband, Fred R., and three children, Joseph, 18, Frederick, 16, and Jean, 8.

Funeral arrangements will be made later through Deputy Coroner H. C. Stock at Ashland.
