I. A. MERRIMAN TRACT ON PACIFIC HIGHWAY IS SOLD

An important transaction of Rogue river valley land has been announced. William Olson of this city, associated with Chauncey Florey in the real estate business with office in the First National bank building, has purchased from the I. A. Merriman estate a tract of land containing between 40 and 50 acres, with about 3900 feet of frontage on the Pacific highway, about half-way between this city and Central Point. The soil on this land is rated with the best in the county and on account of its fine location is considered a very excellent piece of property. The exact amount paid for the same has not been announced, but it is understood the figure was a very attractive one and a cash deal. The new owner did not say just what he is going to do with this land, but it is well located for splitting up into smaller tracts. There will probably be some homes built for people who are coming to the valley and wish to settle on small tracts of land. There is also a first-class location on this property for a store and service station, the purchaser declares.

ASHLAND LIBRARY ABANDONS AID TO COUNTY READERS

A shake-up of the county library system is predicted by the Ashland Tidings in the following news item of interest to the Medford patrons of the public library, as well as to rural users of library books throughout Jackson county: "Starting January 1, 1926, no book borrowers at the Ashland city library will be allowed the privilege of borrowing books unless they are residents, within the city limits of Ashland, it was announced this morning by Miss Blanche Hicks, librarian. "This action will cause more than 400 out of city borrowers, who have been accommodated at the local library for several years, to be without a ready source of book borrowing, and it is believed, will cause a shake-up in the county library system. "At the present time, the library at Medford in the county library, and all residents of the county, with the exception of the people of Ashland, are supposed to be served by the Medford library. Funds from the county treasury are paid to the Medford library for the accommodation of these out of city borrowers. "The Ashland library, however, has been accommodating the out-of-city borrowers in the southern end of the county for several years. This was done because of the distance these rural borrowers would have had to travel to obtain books from the Medford library, and was an accommodation for both the library at Medford and the rural borrowers. "For this service, the Ashland library has never received any funds, and the directors of the city library have finally decided that it is unfair to the city borrowers to allow the country people, who should be borrowing books from the library at Medford, to use the city library, for which they, through the county, are contributing nothing. "Ashland has never been included in the county library system. When the system was first inaugurated, Jackson county was the only county in the state containing two libraries, with one at Ashland and another at Medford. The Medford library was designated as the county library, but after a hard fight, Ashland succeeded in maintaining her own library independent of the county library, and for which no funds are appropriated by the county.
