CHRISTIANS FIGHT FOR CONTROL OF REDLANDS CHURCH

REDLANDS, Cal., Nov. 16.—(A.P.)—A religious quiet settled down over this orange belt city today as participants in yesterday's near riot at the First Christian church prepared to shift the scene of their conflict to San Bernardino, the county seat, where opponents of the Rev. R. Glenn Edwards, formerly of Yuma, Ariz., hoped to obtain the assistance of law enforcement officials in their efforts to oust him from the pulpit. Sunday morning services were thrown into an uproar yesterday when Garner O. Osdick, son-in-law of Justice G. G. McIver, leader of the forces opposing Edwards, arose from his pew as the pastor began to speak. Reminding the congregation that at a meeting last Friday Mr. Edwards "had been voted out of the pulpit by 143 members," Osdick inquired pointedly of the clergyman whether he intended to bow to the will of the 143. The pastor replied that he did not, explaining that since there are 475 members of the church the will of the 143 was but the will of a minority. His remarks were made with difficulty after shouts of "throw him out," "set down," "let him speak" and the singing of "Nearer My God to Thee," by the choir. One of the few women present at the services which were expected to be stormy in view of a month long clash of factions favoring and opposing the retention of Edwards as pastor, attempted to quell the tumult by hastening to the pulpit and, with her hand on the Bible, appealing for peace. Her voice was lost in a sea of shouting, hoots and catcalls. Quiet came eventually when about 100 members walked out of the church in "a peaceful demonstration." Later Osdick announced he and other members of his faction would go to San Bernardino today "to seek a criminal complaint against the pastor" and the three others charging them with disturbing a religious meeting. He alleged that Edwards and his supporters by "invading" the church after the pastor had been "deposed," were to blame for the resultant uproar.

KING TUT'S BODY LITERALLY MASS OF RARE JEWELS

CAIRO, Nov. 16.—(A.P.)—The treasures found in the tomb of the boy king, Tut-Ankh-Amen, soon will be brought to the Cairo museum for exhibition. Meanwhile as they are being finished the tomb will be closed to visitors. The evidence thus far adduced through a dissection of the mummy in its coffin of gold tends to show that it is of a male, not yet an adult and that when death came the person was greatly emaciated. The mummy was not removed from its case, but instead the wrappings about it were cut through from the mask to the feet. Owing to the fragile condition of the wrappings, the greatest care had to be exercised. During the work a large number of interesting and beautiful objects were brought to view. The ministry of works here says that both forearms of the mummy were loaded with magnificent jewels. Other objects brought to light were armlets and collarettes. A superb gold dagger with a crystal handle, bracelets of intricate workmanship and finger rings of diverse materials. Another dagger also was found and several large inlaid ornaments, beads and circlets. On each ankle of Tut-Ankh-Amen were golden circles and on each toe, each finger, a golden stall. Only the lower part of the body and the limbs of the pharaoh had been exposed to the view of the workers. In the tomb last Friday and the operation is of such a delicate nature that further progress will be slow. As soon as possible, the objects wofund will be cleaned and restored, after which they will be brought here and placed on exhibition. The Abnormal Menace.
