

NEW YORK LODGE OF ELKS MAY BE FORCED TO QUIT

WICHITA FALLS, Texas, Nov. 17.—(A. P.)—Violation of any law will prevent an Elks lodge in the United States having a charter. Judge William H. Atwell of the north Texas United States district court and grand exalted ruler of the lodge, said today. Judge Atwell was commenting about a report that a movement was on foot demanding that every member of the order sign a pledge to refrain from taking liquor onto lodge property or drop membership.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(A. P.)—Officials of the New York mother lodge of Elks today refused to place a construction upon the announcement made by Grand Exalted Ruler Atwell prior to the receipt of a formal communication from him. The lodge yesterday accepted a padlock order which will close its restaurant and grill for six months.

The authority of Judge Atwell to withdraw a lodge charter was said here to be indisputable. Members of the lodge declared, however, there was no movement on foot among their associates to sign the pledge referred to by the head of the order.

CALL GRAND JURY TO MEET THURSDAY

A meeting of the grand jury has been called to convene Thursday morning, and will consider criminal matters pending, which include three liquor violations, a check forgery charge, and a statutory charge from Gold Hill. The grand jury personnel is the same as in the May term of court, holding over for the October term, upon a court order which set forth "economy," the "best interests of the county," and "the familiarity of the grand jury with the situation" as the reason.

The petit jury will resume Wednesday morning, and will hear civil cases until Monday, when the trial of Omar W. Murphy, charged with manslaughter is scheduled.

HUSKIES PLAN TO PLAY DARTMOUTH NEW YEAR'S DAY

SEATTLE, Nov. 17.—The University of Washington, foremost on the Pacific coast in football and Dartmouth college, out in front in the east, were under consideration today for a

game in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena New Year's day.

No invitation had been extended to any team, it was stated here. This matter is being handled for the Pacific coast intercollegiate conference by Jack Benefield, graduate manager at the University of Oregon. If Washington is invited, the invitation will not be considered, it was learned, until after a game with Oregon here Thanksgiving day that ends the Husky season. The decision rests with the players, but they were reported practically a unit in feeling that if they completed their claim to the Pacific coast championship by defeating Oregon it would be incumbent upon them to represent the coast against the east if called upon to do so.

REPORTED DEATH OF CLEMENCEAU FALSE
