

INJUNCTION WILL BE FILED AGAINST BIG OREGON ESTATE

ASTORIA, Ore., Nov. 18.—(A.P.) Injunction suits aimed to prevent the distribution of the \$250,000 estate of the late Mrs. Asmus Brix to her natural mother will be filed within a few days by the state of Oregon and K. Rhodes of Salem, who are investigating the mother's helpship in a three-sided legal battle. This was indicated by attorneys here today.

Frau Margarita Fralerson of Hamburg, Germany, mother of the late Mrs. Brix, was designated as sole heir to the Brix estate in an order filed in the probate court by Judge T. S. Cornelius.

The petitions for injunctions will be filed in the circuit court asking that Frau Fralerson be restrained from securing the estate.

Some of those will be filed on behalf of the state of Oregon which contends the state should be escheated to the state on the grounds that Frau Fralerson has no right to the estate.

The second injunction will be filed by Russell Sewell, Portland attorney, who represents the Rhodes family of Salem, who reared Mrs. Brix.

BIG FARM UNION MERGER IS URGED

MITCHELL, S. D., Nov. 18.—Plans for merging farm organizations representing twenty-three agricultural states to provide a centralized program of activity were heard at the opening of the National Farmers Union convention here today. Discussion of the proposed merger of the farmers union, the Equity Co-operative exchange and the National Producers alliance into a single co-operative body was one of the matters scheduled for early consideration at the sessions which will be concluded Thursday.

An address by Governor Carl Gunderson of South Dakota, opened an extensive program of speeches.

Among states in the early delegates are: Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Washington, Oregon and South Dakota.

President Willing to Listen to U-Boat Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(A.P.)—The policy as to submarines laid down by the Washington government at the time of the arms conference here remains unchanged, although President Coolidge is prepared to listen with an open mind to suggestions for further restrictions of that class of armament.

Renewal in England of the British proposal for abolition of submarines resulted in the assertion at the White House today that the American policy had not been altered. The original American suggestion to the Washington conference proposed merely to limit submarine tonnage as well as that of all other types of naval craft.

Moore Names Deputy.
SALEM, Ore., Nov. 14.—R. C. Stevenson of Portland has been appointed by Will Moore, state insurance commissioner, as deputy commissioner to succeed H. C. Manola, resigned. Mr. Manola's resignation was due to ill health, he having been unable to attend to his duties for several months. He has returned to his farm near Milton, Umatilla county.

Radio News

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—(A.P.)—Radio has climbed in a little more than five years from the hobby of a few scientists with a total annual business of less than \$6,000,000, to a business of more than \$500,000,000 in 1925, a growth almost unparalleled in American industry.

Schools, churches and newspapers have seized upon this new medium of reaching the homes until one-third of the broadcasting stations which supply the entertainment for the millions of sets are operated by these three groups.

There are now 584 stations, more or less active, and 108 of these are operated by educational institutions, 47 by churches and 39 by newspapers.

Manufacturers estimate for 1927 indicate a sale of three million radio sets and twenty million tubes. This year's volume of radio business, according to Mayor Herbert H. Frost, Chicago, president of the Radio Manufacturer's association, will exceed last year's by \$200,000,000.

Besides the completed sets sales of \$150,000,000 in parts and accessories indicate a considerable volume of home made sets. The industry now employs about 300,000 persons in the 1200 plants and four thousand dealers stores, nearly all of which have come into existence in the last five years.

The program of the 108 school stations varies from the purely scientific to a complete college course such as

is offered by the University of Iowa. Many of the churches also own a circulating supply of receiving sets by which invalid members of the congregation can attend services until again able to go to church.

Hardly any section of the country is beyond the reach of one of the 39 newspaper radio stations, and this group takes the lead in featuring farm talks by experts, market reports and crop prospects.

Every state in the union is represented in the broadcasting column, from one station each in West Virginia and Delaware, to 56 in Illinois. The Chicago zone has 35 of these. California is second with 48 stations and New York has 46.

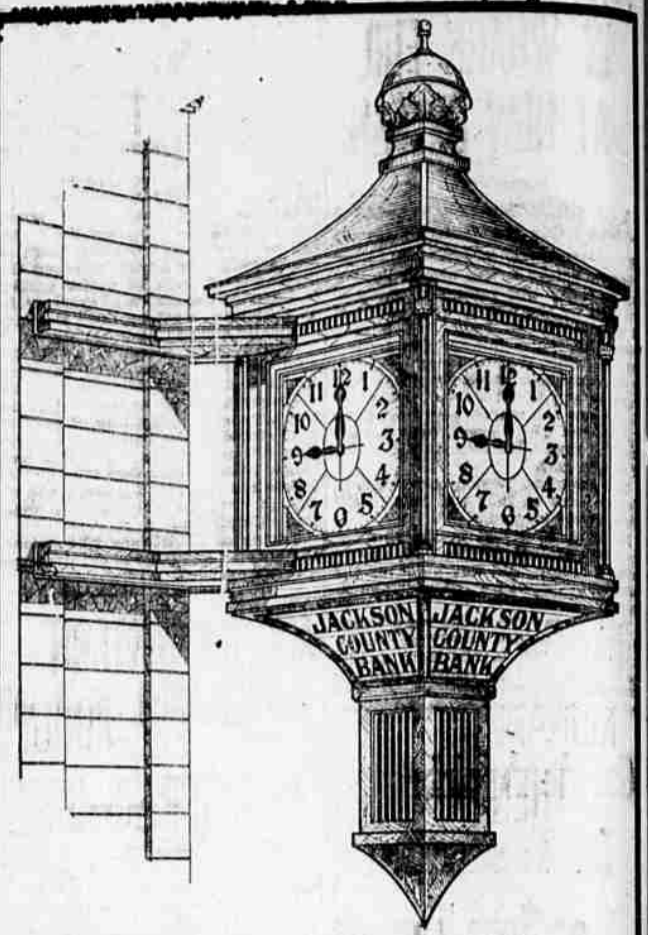
