# SHENANDOAH FRAME WORK DECLARED O. K.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(A. P.)—Tests of Shenandoah wreckage by the bureau of standards show that the condition of the metal frame work was not in such condition as to lower the resistance of the ship.

This conclusion was reported today to the Shenandoah naval court of inquiry. Tests were made on more than two hundred specimens taken at random from the wreckage. There was some corrosion of the duraluminum bears and girders, it was said, but it was insufficient to affect the strength of the metal since the full strength was not utilized in the design of the Shenandoah.
