

### MEDFORD MAKES A RECORD SCORE AGAINST ROSEBURG

Coach Frank Callison's ambition to produce a football team that would defeat an opponent 100 to 0 was realized Wednesday, when his Medford high school team rolled over the Roseburg high school 102 to 0. Scouts were present for the University of Oregon, Jefferson high school and Corvallis, and they saw a plenty.

Conrad, supposed to have a bum hoof played, and scored three touchdowns from the kick-off, and booted 12 out of 15 tries for goals. The Roseburg team offered feeble resistance to a machine going full tilt, and generally a play meant a touchdown. The locals bucked the line, forward passed, criss-crossed, and ripped off tackle. The score at the end of the first half was 48 to 0. In the last half, 12 minute quarters were played to lessen the massacre. Eighteen men were taken along by Medford and every one played. Substitutions were plentiful.

The defeat is the worst ever sustained by a team in southern Oregon high school circles, the previous high record being 101 to 0 against the same warriors in 1922.

The team resumes hard practice tonight, after a week's rest for the Thanksgiving game at Ashland, and the first team will go most of the way with the strongest substitutes in action. It is frankly admitted that the local ambition is to exceed the Armistice day score. Eight new plays have been perfected for use in this game. The officials will be two from the University of California, and one from Stanford.

No word has been received from either the Salem high school or Jefferson high of Portland, in response to an invitation for a post season game.

### SHERIFF DOUBTS HOLD-UP STORY

Although Charles Wagner, a sheepherder of the Central Point district, maintains he was held up about 9 o'clock last night on a city street, where he was found with bruises and cuts about the face and arms, the sheriff's office is inclined to discredit his story.

Wagner says he lost \$25 in cash and a gold watch, but the sheriff, after a thorough questioning last night, thinks he was under the influence of liquor and fell out of a car onto the street, causing the battered appearance.

Wagner was taken to the county jail last night and released this morning to nurse his injuries. He was to undergo a more thorough questioning this afternoon by the sheriff.

### GRAND JURY HEARS GOLD HILL CASE

The grand jury held over from the May term of court convened this morning and spent the forenoon examining the witnesses in the Trudal case. This is an alleged statutory offense arising in the Gold Hill district. Two liquor violation charges and a forgery charge are scheduled among the known criminal matters to be investigated. The grand jury is expected to conclude its sessions by tomorrow evening.

**Boy Bound Over.**  
ALBANY, Ore., Nov. 19.—(A. P.)—John Schwindt, 15, was bound over to the grand jury today on a charge of first degree murder as the result of shooting his father to death. The fatal shot was fired while the father was punishing another son. The elder Schwindt died Sunday.

### OREGON TO GET OVER A MILLION FOR FOREST ROADS

Oregon will get the benefit of nearly a million and a quarter dollars of federal money for forest roads and trails during the fiscal year 1926, according to word received by District Forester C. M. Granger of Portland, announcement of which was made by the Crater National Forest office here today.

The total road and trail appropriation amounting to \$1,243,895.68 is divided between four separate funds. This is direct appropriation by congress for Oregon, which with the addition of \$168,802.50 from the 25 per cent road and school fund, makes a grand total in these funds alone of \$1,412,698.18 to be spent in Oregon by the federal forest service, as compared with \$675,216.80, the total amount the federal government took in last year from the sales of timber, grazing fees and other sources from all of the 14 national forests in the state.

Two of these funds, the so-called section 8 and forest highway funds, amounting this year to \$718,555, are direct appropriations in the nature of compensation for taxes on national forests. The money is used on roads of primary importance to the state, county or local community.

The ten per cent fund, amounting this year to \$675,216.80 for Oregon, is also in lieu of taxes. It is made up of one-tenth of all the national forest receipts in the state from sale of timber and other resources. The fund is used for smaller projects of benefit to local forest communities. This is in addition to the 25 per cent fund, which returns one-quarter of the national forest receipts directly to the state for roads and schools.

There has been a total of \$7,755,490.17 appropriated for Oregon under these various road and trail funds since they were established, according to the report. This is nearly one-eighth of the total for the entire country, \$59,588,330.34. A total of 32 states have participated in the distribution, with Oregon second.

Headquarters will be a busy place tonight, as the scout troop, consisting of men who are in training for scoutmaster positions are to take part in a contest between the "Owl" patrol and the "Bear Cat" patrol to see which can make fire in the best manner. The fire is to be made by rubbing sticks, commonly known as "fire by friction" and was the method used by the Indians before matches were thought of.

The prospective scout leaders will also have their first lesson in first aid.

**Court of Honor.**  
November 25 is the date of the next court of honor, a number of scouts have applications in for merit badges and two or three will apply for star rank. Scouts expecting to take part in first and second class rank must advise headquarters at once, this also applies to merit badge applicants.

Scout headquarters will remain open until six every night until further announcement.

Armistice day was a busy one for the scouts in and around Medford, when assembling for the parade in the morning, the police department requested that a number be assigned to them to help clear the streets by moving automobiles that were in the line of march and also to direct traffic during the time that the parade was moving. Those scouts remaining at headquarters made a fine showing in the line of march and were highly complimented on all sides.

Troops 4 and 5 have been consolidated into one, under the leadership of O. L. Cornwall as scoutmaster. At their meeting last Friday night in the Presbyterian church they organized new patrols and selected the following leaders: Roland Kring, S. P. L.; Lee Van Audale, scribe; Ben Newman, P. L. A.; Charley, P. L.; Stan Smith, P. L. and Robert Mason, P. L.

New Life has come to Troop 1, which has been without a scoutmaster for about four months. Mr. J. S. Wachnick has been selected by the troop committee as the new scoutmaster. The troop held their first meeting last Friday in the parish of the Catholic church. A lot of real scout "pep" was displayed, the members have planned to make up for the last time.

According to Jackson county traditions, native sons of Butte Creek have long legs from kicking sticky off their boots in youth.

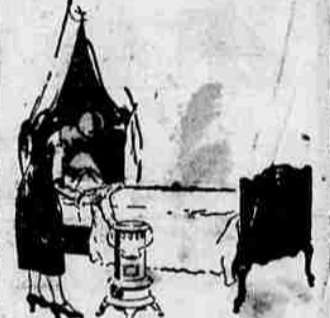
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
