## COPCO BREAKS INTO LITERARY DIGEST COLUMNS

The big wood pipe recently constructed by the California Oregon Power company, as a part of the new Copco Two hydro-electric development is the subject of an article in last week's Literary Digest. This immense conduit, which is the "largest in the world," is a source of great interest throughout the nation, many national magazines and other publications having devoted considerable space to this subject. A good photograph of this huge pipe, with the caption, "The Largest Wooden Pipe in the World" appears in connection with the article which is reproduced herewith:

"The World's Largest Wood Pipe—Users of treated timber may not know, says the Wood Preserving News (Chicago), that for some time this material has held a position among holders of 'world's largest' records, because the world's largest wood pipe-line was constructed of preserved wood. Now this record has been broken by a treated wood-stave pipe-line built in northern California for the California Oregon Power company.

We read:  
"This line connects two cement lined tunnels which carry water from the company's diversion dam to the new plant, located one and one-half miles below Copco on the Klamath river. The plant, which generates 40,000 horse-power, serves fifty communities. This line is sixteen feet in inside diameter, or two feet larger than the line that formerly held the record. It is 1316 feet in length, and made of Douglas fir staves four inches thick, treated with eighty pounds of creosote per cubic foot. The pipe-line is supported in steel cradles and is entirely open to the air. The maximum head of the line is sixty feet. It discharges 2000 cubic feet of water per second, or more than 100 gallons of water per day for each of 12,000,000 persons. It is interesting to note that the use of creosote for wood-pipe staves is far exceeding original expectations. It is assumed at first that only a small percentage of pipe used for irrigation purposes could be treated. But now most of the wood-stave irrigation lines are constructed of preserved wood. No objectionable taste remains after the creosote has been flushed out. This pipe-line is considered practically a permanent installation, provided the steel cradles and bands are painted from time to time."

## DR. JORDAN FINDS ANT IN HONOLULU THAT KILLS FLIES

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—(A.P.)—News of a tiny ant imported from Madagascar that has slaughtered many houseflies in Honolulu was brought by Dr. David Starr Jordan, chancellor emeritus of Stanford university upon his return yesterday with Mrs. Jordan from a two months stay in the Hawaiian islands.

Dr. Jordan, who went to Honolulu to attend the sessions of the Pan-Pacific union, remained to promote the new research department of the territory from which he expects great results.

The islands, Dr. Jordan said, teem in insect life, some of which is beneficial and some malignant. For the latter parasites are needed and the Madagascar ant is the first of these. It has been found to be the deadly enemy of the house fly.

## ASHLAND BEATEN BY GRANTS PASS, IN FINAL RALLY

After leading and playing the better football for three quarters, the Ashland high school exploded in the last three minutes of play and Grants Pass won by the score of 14 to 10, at Grants Pass Wednesday afternoon. The winning touchdown came on a 90-yard run by Paddy Rimer. He scooted through the entire Ashland team with pathetic ease. It was too

much for even Prof. Forsythe, who held his head in his hands, while the slashing, dashing, fighting Ashland teams of former years turned over in their graves and moaned.

Tilton of the Lithia city played good football, while too many of his team mates favored "Tag." One Ashlander, confronted with the necessity of making a tackle, squatted. Another time an Ashland halfback, with a clear field, suspected he would get tackled and when danger neared was apparently overcome with a mysterious pain, for he flopped to the ground in great agony. It was not determined what was the matter, tho the crowd had a diagnosis.

In the last quarter Ashland bucked the ball to the seven yard line, largely through the efforts of Tilton and Gillette. At this critical juncture they fumbled and Grants Pass recovered.

On the next play Rimer made his 90-yard run.

In the first quarter Grants Pass scored and kicked a touchdown. Ashland came back and tied the score and kicked a field goal. With this lead the Granite City team tried 27 forward passes and completed 20 of them.

Grants Pass was penalized three times for unnecessary roughness, and Ashland twice.

The best part of the game was the Grants Pass rooting section. They can out-yell anything in southern Oregon.
