Queen Mother Alexandra, Widow of King Edward VII, Passes Away Peacefully With Children at Bedside—Prince of Wales Arrives Too Late—Empire Mourns.

BUSINESS HAS NOTHING TO FEAR SAYS PRESIDENT

In N. Y. Speech Mr. Coolidge Declares Legitimate Business Will Not Be Interfered With—Urges Adherence to World Court.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—(A. P.) Legitimate business has the assurance of President Coolidge that his administration will not interfere with its activities so long as they are conducted on true business lines and kept within legitimate bounds.

In an address last night before the New York state chamber of commerce the president advocated the largest possible co-operation between government and business and emphasized that the whole policy of the government in its system of opposition to monopoly and its public regulation of transportation and trade has been animated by a desire to have business remain business.

"The present generation of business," he added, "almost universally throughout its responsible organization and management, has shown every disposition to correct its own abuses with as little intervention from the government as possible."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—President and Mrs. Coolidge returned to the capital shortly after seven o'clock this morning from their twenty-four hour trip to New York where, Mr. Coolidge last night addressed the chamber of commerce.

HOLD-UP IS CHARGED TO RED GRANGE

Harold Wills, Head of Wills Sainte Claire Auto Co., Says Football Star Threatened Him if He Didn't Give Grange Car for Use of Name in Ad.

DETROIT, Nov. 20.—(A. P.)—The Detroit news today quotes C. Harold Wills, president of Wills Sainte Claire, Inc., motor car makers, as saying that Harold "Red" Grange, appeared at the main offices of the company at Marysville, Mich last June and demanded an automobile "to square the use of Grange's name in a series of advertisements."

Grange was quoted by Wills as saying he (Grange) was better known than "Babe" Ruth and the Wills car would reap much benefit from the intertwining of the Grange name with it. It was to "square" this, Wills said, that Grange sought the car.

CAPT. FOLEY FREED BY NAVY COURT

Former Judge Advocate Is Completely Exonerated of Charges Made By Mrs. Lansdowne—Acted Entirely in Line of Duty—Widow's Attorney Protests Verdict.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(A. P.)—Captain Paul Foley was exonerated today by the Shenandoah naval court of inquiry of Mrs. Margaret Ross Lansdowne's charge that he sought to sway her testimony.

The court held that Captain Foley, its former judge advocate, was not guilty either of seeking to cause false testimony to be offered before the court, or of seeking to "improperly means to influence" the widow of the Shenandoah's commander.
