

### ARMISTICE FILMS TO BE SHOWN TO MEDFORD LEGION

The members of Medford post of the American Legion are to have the privilege of witnessing the first showing of the films taken here last week of the Armistice day celebration. These films, which were procured as a part of the new "Copeco Current Events" covering happenings of local interest, have just arrived and are being edited and put in shape for next Monday night, when they will be presented at the regular bi-monthly meeting of the post.

Some of the "shots" of the Armistice parade were obtained, including a generous force of the Legion drum corps, World War veterans and other marching bands, as well as many of the floats and other items of interest. The Medford-Ash and football game will be reviewed on the screen during the program, and other films featuring Medford high school's football team will be shown.

Many interesting matters will come up during the post meeting, including a report on the Armistice day celebration, and all indications point to a busy evening. A fund will be put on after the meeting by the Legion, the Ladies' Auxiliary being invited guests. There will also be a business meeting of the "40 and 8" society.

### TWO SMALL FIRES QUICKLY PUT OUT

What might have been a serious fire was averted at the home of P. R. Horn, 712 West Eleventh street last evening at 5 o'clock when fire in an overheated stove was extinguished. Nobody was home at the time the flames blazed highest, calling the attention of a neighbor who broke in the door and squelched the blazing mill blocks and paper in the stove. The plastered walls and ceiling of the room were badly scorched.

At 6:30 last evening the department answered a summons at the Crater Lake Garage where a large touring car had caught fire from a presumed short circuit. Five gallons of chemical was used by the fireman. Although a chemical tank was hanging near the scene of the blaze, it was not used by the garage men, said the firemen.

### COUNTY COURT CUTS LOADS ON HIGHWAY

The county court Wednesday signed an order reducing the maximum loads on Jackson county roads to the following:

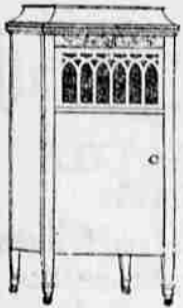
On old macadam roads, maximum 16,500 pounds for trucks with tires over 30 inches, and for trucks with tires less than 30 inches, 1500 pounds per inch.

On the Rich, Central Point-Sams Valley, Coker, Butte-Buckshot Hill and Butte Falls market roads the maximum was placed at 10,000 pounds, and for trucks with less than 30 inch tires, 375 pounds per inch.

On all dirt roads the maximum is placed at 8000 pounds, and 200 pounds per inch for trucks with tires of less than 30 inches.

The order was executed because county roads were being ruined by overloading, it is said.
