YALE HELD TO TIE BY HARVARD

Historic Rivals Clash Before 50,000—Old Eli, Favorite, Meets Reverse—Both Kick Often—Crimson Smothers Blue's Passing Attack in Season's Biggest Upset

HARVARD STADIUM, CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 21.—(A. P.)—Yale and Harvard fought a desperate scoreless battle today before a crowd of 53,000, thereby furnishing another upset in this remarkable season of reversals.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 21.—(A. P.)—A half century of football rivalry was celebrated in Soldiers field today when Harvard and Yale faced each other on the gridiron.

At the opening of the second period Yale took the ball on downs on its own 45-yard line.

Getting the ball on the kick-off, Yale, by short dashes, carried it to the Crimson 24-yard line.

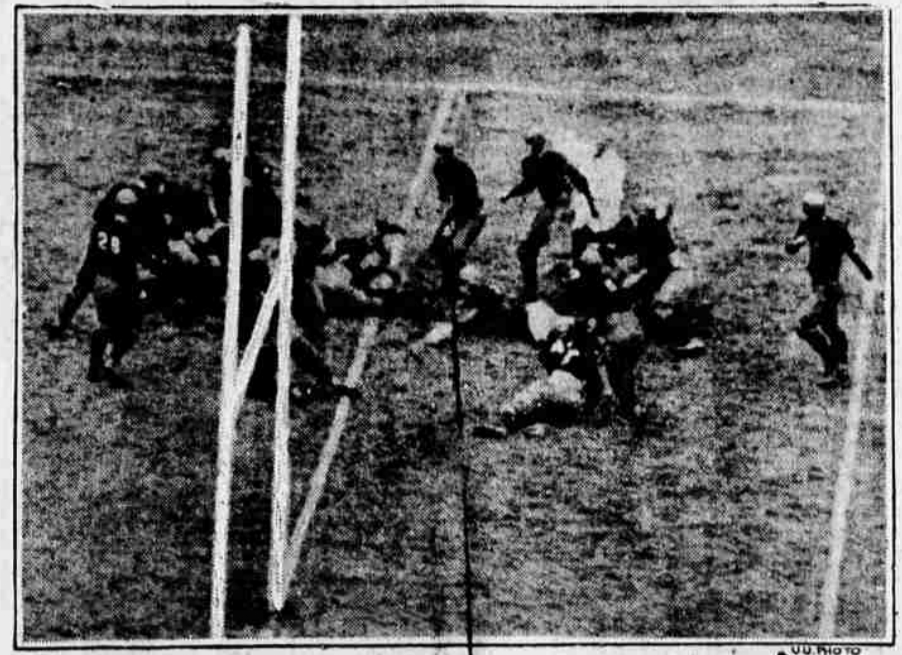
