Sixty-five fires in Oregon or during October, outside of Portland, resulted in losses aggregating \$166,706.24. The heaviest single loss during the month was represented by the destruction of a lumber mill at Greenberg, with a loss of \$30,000. On the 65 fires 25 were in city dwellings and 11 in farm dwellings. Six fires in garages resulted in losses aggregating \$35,275. Four of the month's fires resulted from defective electric wiring, three from explosions, four were of incendiary origin and 16 from overheated or defective flues or stoves.

TIDAL WAVE HITS MEXICAN TOWNS

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 20.—(A. P.) Dispatches from towns near Zihuatanejos, the Pacific coast port which has been inundated by a tidal wave, say that the wave was 35 feet high. It swept suddenly over the little port, which was submerged for two hours. There is still no communication with Zihuatanejos and no direct reports have been received from there.

No estimate of the number of number of deaths are available.

The tidal waves, which occurred Tuesday is believed to have been caused by a volcanic disturbance somewhere in the Pacific, although this theory cannot be confirmed.

FORD FREIGHT BY AIR IN FLORIDA

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 20.—(A. P.)—Henry Ford is planning the establishment of commercial airplane service in Florida to relieve freight congestion caused by the railroad embargo. It was stated in high official quarters here today.

In a special message to the Florida legislature now in extraordinary session, Governor Martin asked for enactment of legislation to encourage the navigation of commercial aircraft in this state. The governor stated in his message that he had been reliably "informed that one of the greatest of America's industrial pioneers would come to Florida to relieve the railroad congestion by means of airplanes."

Seymour Jones, Candidate Governor, Visits Medford

Mr. and Mrs. Seymour Jones of Salem are in the city today visiting friends. Mr. Jones was speaker of the Oregon house of representatives in 1919 and the special session of 1920. During these sessions both the 18th and 19th amendments to the constitution were adopted. Mr. Jones had also served in the house when he was not speaker.

Mr. Jones will very likely be a candidate for the republican nomination for governor, but when asked if his hat had been pitched into the ring he smiled and replied, "not yet."
