

MINING CONVENTION SEN. STANFIELD WILL AT SPOKANE NOV. 30 BE CRATERS' GUEST TO BE BIG AFFAIR AT PUBLIC MEET

According to Frank C. Bailey, secretary of the Northwest Mining convention, 500 mining men from all parts of the Pacific Coast, including annual convention of the Northwest Mining Association to be held at Spokane, Washington, from November 30th to December 5th, inclusive. An excellent program has been arranged and the outlook is bright for a large and interesting exhibit of ores. The arrangements so far made and announced by Secretary Bailey indicate that more than the usual attention will be paid to the newer mining districts, and to the older districts which are showing signs of a mining revival.

The Southwestern Oregon Mining bureau is arranging to send a delegation to this convention as well as a characteristic display of ores from this section. It is a wonderful opportunity to bring to the attention of this large body of experienced mining men, representing millions of capital, what we have here in the way of mineral resources. It will not do to make any half-hearted attempt to arrange for this display, as we will be competing with all other mining districts of the northwest, nor will it do to send a small delegation to invite the 1926 convention to come to southwestern Oregon. Whatever is done, must be done on a proper basis, else not done at all.

By taking advantage of opportunities of this character, our section of the state will be developed by experienced mining capital and the development will surely come, as we have the ores that only await the touch of the experienced hand, backed by adequate capital to beget about such results. We must, however, convince the experienced mining man, and with the foundation heretofore laid by adequate publicity this can be brought about by taking samples of our ores to him, as seeing is believing and with his knowledge of mineral generally he cannot help but become interested in the wonderful array we can arrange from this district. With 500 mining men to thus be brought in touch with these ores, it is readily seen that the results to be obtained are of great proportions.

This exhibit and the delegates must leave here not later than Saturday of next week, and the fund is at this time inadequate to meet the expenses of the trip. As a matter of public spirit and a desire to assist in the bringing about of more prosperous conditions in southwestern Oregon, the Southwestern Oregon Mining bureau asks that it be placed in a position to carry forward this desirable work in a manner befitting its importance. Paul McDonald, who is general chairman of the entertainment and toastmaster for tomorrow's meeting, has announced an interesting program which will feature the Craters eight-piece orchestra, vocal solos by Crater members including Herb Alford and songs by the Craters. Out-of-town visitors will also be given an opportunity to speak. A charge of one dollar a plate will be made. Ladies are especially invited. Members of the Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs are requested to wear their badges.

SELECT JURY TO HEAR EVIDENCE IN O. W. MURPHY CASE

Selection of a jury in the trial of Omra W. Murphy, veteran resident of this city, charged with manslaughter, as the result of the death of his wife, Ella last spring, was completed in the circuit court this morning. The jury includes two women, both residents of Ashland, Mrs. Esther Swedeburg and Mrs. Alice Peil. State Senator George E. Dunn is also a member. J. J. Buchter of this city was selected as an alternate juror.

The state alleges that Murphy, during a family quarrel, beat his wife so severely that her death resulted several weeks later.

The defense contends that Mrs. Murphy died from other causes, and that the alleged beating was "only a spanking."

The jury this morning visited the Murphy home, and the opening arguments will be made this afternoon.
