

J. B. COAN RESIGNS AS PASTOR LOCAL M. CHURCH, SOUTH

Rev. J. B. Coan, pastor of the South Methodist church of this city, for the past two years and over, and prominent in religious and civic affairs in the community, announced his resignation yesterday to take effect December first. Mr. Coan's decision to sever his pastorate here came as a distinct surprise both to his church and his many friends in the community.

Mr. Coan has accepted the appointment of superintendent and executive secretary of the Wesley hospital of Marshfield, a new institution of the Oregon conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. His appointment to this department of ministerial service came however from Bishop H. M. DuBose of the Southern Church in conjunction with that of Bishop Shepard of the Methodist Episcopal church of this area.

His work as pastor of the local church is reported to be eminently satisfactory. In fact the reports of the past two years are said to reveal a prosperity which the church has not enjoyed for several years. Mr. Coan has devoted considerable time to the development of activities among the young people and the boy's department and leaves them and the church generally in a very flourishing condition. His successor has not yet been announced.

Two years ago Mr. Coan organized the Boy Scout movement in the community and has since served as Scout commissioner in that organization. As a member of the city planning commission he has been connected with many civic enterprises.

In his new field of work as superintendent he will have the management and administration of the hospital and as executive secretary for the conference hospital board he will cultivate this department of service among the churches and organize the white cross societies for benevolent work. The Wesley hospital was opened last July. It is a handsome, twenty-five thousand dollar plant and erected under the ministry of Dr. Temple, now pastor of the First Methodist church of Medford.

Fourteen Medford Scouts Go to Portland

On Thursday afternoon after their big Thanksgiving dinner at home, 14 Scouts will leave for Portland to attend the patrol leaders' conference for three days, the 27th, 28th and 29th. This conference will be attended by Scouts from all over the state, and be conducted by them.

The program will open Friday afternoon when Governor Pierce will present Eagle Scout badges to all Scouts who have won them. The first session will be in charge of Kenneth Wells, Eagle Scout of Troop 40 of Portland, who will give the address of welcome. Responses from delegates from each council will follow. The first subject to be presented is "The Desirable Qualities of a Leader" by Eagle Scout Jack Travers, Troop 43, Portland, followed by "The Leader and His Training" in charge of four Scouts from Cascade council, Salem, Ore. Other subjects such as "A Model Troop Meeting," "Patrol Organization," "A Model Patrol Meeting," and "A Model Patrol Leaders' Council" will be presented during the conference.

A banquet will be served on Friday night at 6:00, with Scout Don Welsh as toastmaster. Cars are being provided to take the Medford Scouts to and from Portland. The party will return to the city Sunday night.

The regular monthly Court of Honor will be in the public library Wednesday night at 7:30; this court will be presided over by Judge Hartzell. A number of Scouts will apply for advancement in rank and expect to receive their awards. Scouts from Ashland, Gold Hill and Central Point have been invited to attend this court and may also take advancement.

CARVER, Miss., Nov. 24.—(A.P.)—"Sauce from God's cranberry bog," the bit of land dedicated here last spring to the support of the little white church at the wayside, will add spice this year to thousands of dinners from that of President Coolidge to that of a Cape Cod missionary in India.

Rev. Charles W. Hadden, leader of the congregation, announced the receipt yesterday of an acknowledgment from the president's secretary which read:

"It was indeed kind of you to send to the president the cranberries which carry with them such interesting associations, and the president has asked me to express to you his thanks for them."

Mrs. Annie Shertoff Jorndway, a parishioner, whose bog holdings are large, last spring gave a small area for the experiment of the church. Prayers for the success of the venture were said when frosts or other dangers threatened. The bog yielded 100 per cent more berries than in any of the past thirty years.
