### 144 PHEASANTS RELEASED HERE BY GAME COMM.

Twelve crates of 72 pairs of China pheasants were liberated on valley farms and game refuges this forenoon, following their arrival from the state game farm at Eugene this morning by train. The arrival of the birds today is but a part of a shipment of several hundred more that are expected for liberation in southern Oregon.

The birds are half grown and are said to be strong enough to migrate themselves to southern Oregon. On this account, according to Deputy State Game Warden Pat Dalley, the pheasants were shipped at this time because of the expense of feeding thru the winter months.

Two dozen of the birds were liberated at each of the following ranches and orchards: Ray Hogan, Bert Anderson, the Hillcrest, Hollowood, and Meridian orchards and Judge J. W. Hartzell.

The pheasants were reared on revenue obtained from hunting licenses, the state maintaining three game farms, one at Eugene, one at Corvallis and the other at Pendleton, for the sole purpose of supplying game for sportsmen in local seasons.

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### CRATERS DINNER TO STANFIELD AT 6.30 TONIGHT

Mr. Stanfield will be introduced by W. H. Gore, who is thoroughly conversant with the Oregon and California land grant problem. Paul McDonald, general chairman of the Crater-Stanfield meeting and toastmaster at this evening's gathering, has announced a program of unusual interest. There will be several musical numbers by Crater members, songs by the entire club and snappy orchestra music by the famous Craters eight-piece symphonies. In addition to Mr. Stanfield's address and the talk by Mr. Gore, out-of-town guests will be given an opportunity to speak. The gathering tonight will be strictly non-partisan and the speakers will have subjects of general rather than political interest.

All of Medford's service clubs and the general public have been invited to participate in tonight's meeting with the Craters. The ladies are especially invited. A charge of \$1 a plate will be made for one of Dinty Mohr's turkey dinners and Chairman McDonald has assured the people of southern Oregon that the meeting will be well worth attending. A special committee under the direction of Tom Swen has been busily engaged this afternoon in decorating the main dining room of the Hotel Medford for tonight's dinner, which will begin at 6:30 o'clock.

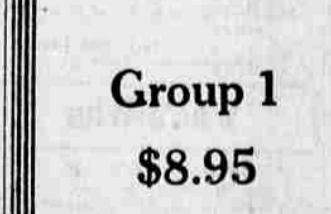

The French post at Rashidya, west of Damascus was relieved this afternoon after its garrison of 250 men had put up a strong defense, holding off several Druse attacks on the beleaguered citadel, the French defenders resorted to bombardment of the town to which the tribesmen had set fire.



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### S. P. RAISES CLASS RATES IN OREGON, PROTEST EXPECTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 23.—(A. P.) A new scale of class rates on commodities moving between California and Oregon points will be put into effect December 28 by the Southern Pacific company unless a suspension order comes from the inter-state commerce commission. This announcement was made here today by J. H. Mulcahy, assistant traffic manager. Increase in typical instances range from 72 cents to \$2.11 a hundred pounds. Butter, eggs and cheese will be subjected to substantially higher freight charges.

The increase was ordered by the inter-state commerce commission without a formal hearing. Portland shipping interests indicated today that protests will be made by Portland, San Francisco and Oakland shippers' organizations in the hope that the order will be suspended.
