

FARMER IS HELD FOR MURDER IN HEADLESS CRIME

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 24.—(A. P.) J. R. Bolen, prominent farmer of the Mill Plain section, six miles east of Vancouver, was arrested today on a charge of murder in connection with the death last July of Walter W. Fleming, aged 19, whose headless body was found floating in the Columbia river.

With the arrest of Bolen came first intimation that the body of Fleming had been identified. He is said by Sheriff Thompson to have been a deserter from the United States and prior to his death an employe of Bolen for more than a year. Fleming disappeared about the time that a fire destroyed the house, barn and prune dryer on the Bolen farm. Bolen, a cripple, told officers at the time that he had quarreled with Fleming and expressed the opinion that Fleming had set fire to the buildings and fled.

The body of Fleming was finally identified through finger prints from the war department at Washington, D. C.

The fires on the Bolen farm occurred on the night of July 23-24, the fire breaking out in three buildings at once, although they were some distance apart.

Bolen was in the house alone, his wife and child being in Seattle. Neighbors saw the fire and rushed to the house and seemed to have difficulty in arousing him but he appeared at a window in time to escape the flames.

More than a year ago Bolen was damaged by a team of horses and so injured that he has walked on crutches since.

In December, 1924, he employed Fleming. The quarrel, Bolen declared started over a calf which he asked Fleming to care for. Fleming objected, saying it was not his work.

Search for his head has proved fruitless.

Bolen has lived in Clarke county for more than fourteen years, having been employed by different firms. He moved to the farm, which was inherited by his wife, about three years ago.

State Fire Warden W. A. Groce and his deputy, H. D. Shewmaker, investigated the fire, and has made no report of his findings. For that reason \$6500 insurance on the buildings has not been paid.

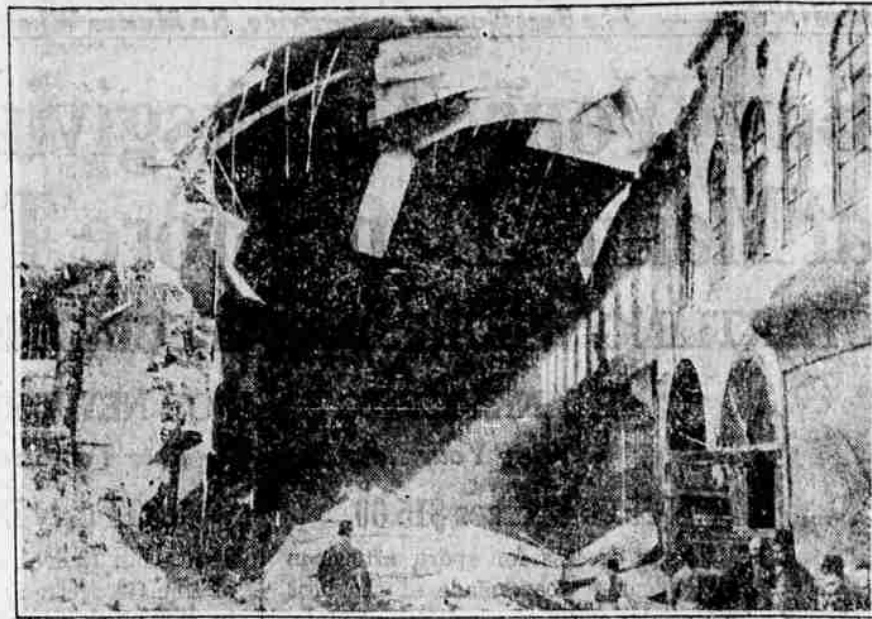

PUBLIC SERVICE CORPORATION TAX IN STATE RAISED

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—Public service corporations in Oregon will in 1926 pay taxes on apportioned corporation property valuations increased \$6,538,561.32 over the valuations fixed by the state tax commission a year ago for 1925. This became known today when the tax commission completed tabulating its summary of the assessment roll of public service corporations as equalized and apportioned by the tax commission.

The total assessed value of the corporations according to the new summary is \$253,531,606.02, but the apportioned value on which the taxes will actually be paid is \$155,053,307.71. The latter figure is total of utility values as apportioned to the counties according to their ratios of assessed to actual valuation.

The new summary gives the apportioned valuations according to the classification of public service companies as follows:

Steam railroad companies, union station and depot companies, \$95,305,713.89.

Electric and street railway companies \$1,339,970.59.

Car companies \$1,508,240.28.

Electric companies \$5,484,330.05.

Water and gas companies \$7,297,040.02.

Joint utilities (electric, water, gas) \$29,796,365.81.

Express companies \$331,487.76.

Telegraph companies \$1,882,819.28.

Telephone companies \$11,607,450.12.

Total \$155,053,307.71.

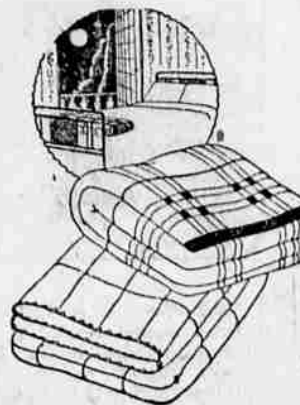
