HUSKIES EXPECT A HARD GAME WITH OREGON SATURDAY

SEATTLE, Nov. 24.—(A. P.)—With gloomy Gusses of football pointing to the University of Washington's defeat by the University of Oregon last year, 7 to 3, Coach Enoch Bagshaw today was given his hitherto unbeaten pet final admonitions for the last game of the season here between teams of the universities Thursday.

Heavy practice was expected to end today, tomorrow being given over to rest. Egbert Brix, Husky left guard, is not expected to be in the line Thursday, due to injuries in the California game. Earl Papp, substitute tackle, is nursing a cracked rib as a result of the College of Puget Sound game. The remainder of the squad is in prime condition.

In the eighteen times the Huskies and Webfooters have met in the past, Washington has won eight contests, Oregon seven and three have ended in ties. Oregon has the edge in score totals, holding 188 counts to Washington's 181. The largest score is credited to Oregon, winning 43 to 0 in 1909.

AGGIES CELEBRATE WINNING TITLE

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 24.—Back from what they described as their hardest battle of the year, the Oregon Aggie grid warriors are taking some badly needed rest before starting training for their final game of the season with Southern California at Los Angeles two weeks hence.

Schulmerich and Luby were added to the hospital list in the Vandal fray, though it is confidently hoped that the entire squad will be in shape for the southern game.

A huge welcome rally for the team was held at the station when the team arrived in celebration of their winning the Northwest championship. The Idaho game completed the Aggies' Northwest conference schedule giving them seven wins with no defeats, a record that even Washington cannot equal as the coming Oregon game will be its fifth and final northwest meet this season.

MANY GAMBLERS LOSE MONEY WHEN SCORE IS CHANGED

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—(A. P.)—The official score of the Stanford-California game, 27 to 14, announced by referee George M. Varnell many hours after the game was ended and all bets had been paid on an apparently official score of 28 to 14, resulted in the loss of thousands of dollars to bettors in this region. The official score became public for the first time while Varnell was en route home from Stanford to Seattle.

As a result many winners who should be losers remain winners for all bets have been paid and the winners are not easily identified.

The betting chiefly affected by the Varnell decision was made under the pool system.

In this wagering the bettor paid a standard amount for a guess as to the final score. The person guessing nearest the correct score would be declared winner.

At least two big pools in San Francisco in which tickets were sold for \$5 ran over \$4000.

Many smaller pools in which fewer people were interested were organized. All of these will undoubtedly be switched and new winners named as a result of Varnell's decision.

But the business of finding those who have already been paid seemed an impossible job for the stake-holders.
