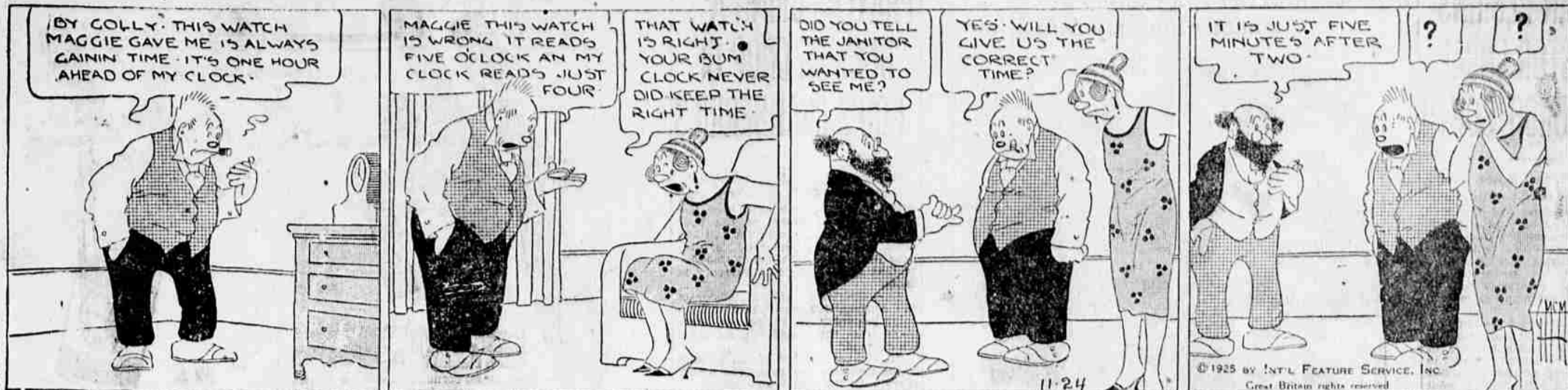

FAKE DOCTOR AND MAYOR OF TOWN GOES TO PRISON

CORDOVA, Alaska, Nov. 24.—(A. P.)—After posing for four years as Dr. John Akin Flanders, serving as mayor of Kenai for three years, and ministering to the medical needs of cannery employes at Bristol Bay and Kenai, Rudolph Griess, former Chicago medical student, was here today on his way to spend a year and a day at the federal penitentiary on McNeill's island. Griess was convicted at Seldovia for violations of Alaska narcotic laws, after admitting during the course of a trial on a statutory charge that he was not the man he pretended to be. Dr. John A. Flanders, who is said to be a physician in Chicago, was Griess' roommate at Loyola college medical school in 1919, Griess testified. Using Dr. Flanders' name in San Francisco in 1921, Griess obtained employment as a doctor for Libby, McNeill & Libby canneries at Bristol Bay and Kenai. Griess was acquitted of the statutory charge.

14-YEAR-OLD GIRL IS MEMBER OF HOLD-UP GANG, SEVEN ARRESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—(A. P.)—Three youths and four women, one 14 years old, were taken by the police here and held in connection with more than a score of automobile holdups in the region of Twin Peaks recently. One of those in custody, Alvin J. Emmons, 22, alias Red Emmons, was said by police to have admitted participating in the holdups. His statements involved Fred Richardson, 21, who admitted a part in the holdups, police said. Both Richardson and Emmons, however, absolved the third youth, under arrest, Harold Houghton, 18. All are said to be from Seattle. The women in custody are: Dolores McCall, 14; Mrs. Beatrice McCall, 23; Miss Fern Richardson, 24; and Mrs. Ida Richardson, Richardson's wife. The women are held for investigation. Three other men, one of whom is said to have a criminal record in northern coast cities, were sought by the police.
