**GAS CO.-SERVICE
RESTORED AFTER
PIPE STOPPAGE**

After having been demoralized for the past two days, service has been restored to Medford gas users by the southern Oregon Gas company, following a stoppage of the gas main near the county fair grounds, due to the cold snap early this week, according to company officials.

Service became demoralized Sunday night, but was not discovered to be so until the following morning when the office phone rang incessantly with complaints. Gas pressure was down to nothing, leaving gas equipped eating houses and homes at loss as how to prepare the morning and noonday meal as well as dinner, as no pressure was restored until seven o'clock Monday morning.

Although the trouble has been remedied for the present, it may again be repeated with continued cold weather, according to company officials, who explain the trouble is due to the contraction of the steel mains, allowing rubber gaskets to be blown from their place between pipe joints by the gas pressure until they pile together, thus causing the pressure to be stopped as if by a cork.

Yesterday marked the completion of the repair work, but several men are still "patrolling" the main to find evidence of leaks, caused by the absence of gaskets.

The recent change of oil to coal gas has also been a cause for the trouble, as the new gas is said to loosen the deposits left in years past by the old in the pipes. Under usual conditions these deposits are blown out through valves at regular distances.
