

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE NOT A PART OF RED CROSS WORK

In distributing the attractive posters advertising the coming Christmas Tuberculosis Seal Sale campaign, Mrs. W. H. Crawford, publicity chairman of the Jackson County Health association, assisted by Mrs. M. C. Pace, report a hearty, as well as understanding, response from practically every Medford merchant asked to prominently display the posters.

A druggist on East Main street asked that two additional of the large posters be left with him for display inside the drug store, explaining, "If people could only realize as we druggists do, the terrible necessity for prompt and efficient fighting of tuberculosis, they would not hesitate for a moment to buy a generous supply of Christmas seals. We have dozens of calls for remedies every day."

There is an element of confusion in the minds of many people regarding the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis association in that they regard these two humanitarian organizations as one. A few years ago this was the case, but now the annual Red Cross roll call is entirely distinct from the annual sale of Christmas Tuberculosis seals. The former campaign ends before Thanksgiving and the seal sale begins after Thanksgiving. The seal sale is the only source of providing funds for the beneficent work of the National Tuberculosis association of which all County Health associations are affiliated bodies.

The functions of the National Tuberculosis association lie not only in fighting the tuberculosis scourge, but in arousing thought of personal bodily welfare in the minds of both children and adults but especially does it work with children.

One of the weapons used to fight disease in the human race is the health crusade program carried on in the elementary schools, which stimulates in an entertaining manner daily thought of bodily cleanliness and general health.

Another weapon is the holding of frequent clinics where trained physicians and nurses put each child through careful preliminary examinations with a view of finding defects deviating from the normal so that proper treatment can be prescribed.

Still another telling weapon is teaching expectant mothers the importance of pre-natal care.

M. MONTGOMERY IS ADVISED TO REST

Mr. and Mrs. Mark Montgomery arrived home last night from a two weeks' sojourn at Medford, Los Angeles and other southern California points, and San Francisco, the last week being spent by Mr. Montgomery as a patient in the Southern Pacific hospital in the latter city, undergoing a thorough examination to ascertain why he had not been enjoying good health for a long time past.

The verdict, after various tests and X-ray examinations, was that there was nothing physically wrong with him; that his trouble was caused by too hard work over a period of years without a vacation; and that a few more weeks of rest would make him as sound as a dollar.

"Monte" was also advised by the experts in charge to lay off his favorite dissipation, coffee and doughnuts, and cut down his smoking.

Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery will sell their home on West Tenth street and remove to Corvallis in time for him to take up his new duties there January 1 as Southern Pacific railroad agent in that city.

DAMAGE SUIT FILED IN AUTO CRASH CASE

Suit has been filed in the circuit court by W. P. Warren against Floyd L. Whillock, asking for \$500 damages and costs for alleged injuries in an auto accident at Main and Barrett streets, September 13th last.

Warren alleges that as a result of "negligent and reckless driving" by Whillock, he was struck by the auto and "severely bruised and cut and injured," from the effects of which he still suffers by pain and loss of sleep. Warren lists his expenses as a result of the accident at \$7.50 for hospital fees, \$30 for clothes, \$10 for an X-ray examination, and \$25 doctor's fees.

DOCTORS FOR STATE CROSS-EXAMINED BY THE DEFENSE

The trial of Omar W. Murphy, charged with manslaughter, as the result of an alleged beating administered to his wife, Ella, last March, was resumed in the circuit court this morning, after a three days' recess, and the entire morning session was devoted to the defense cross-examination of physicians called by the state, with the exception of Sister Mary of Sacred Heart hospital, who testified to the last moments of the dead woman. Drs. Geary and Clancy of this city, and Dr. Woods of Ashland were the other state witnesses, under cross-examination.

The state theory, that death was caused by an embolism, in lay terms, a blood clot, was combated vigorously by the defense, and the question covered every possible cause of death. The queries were confined to the hypothetical question asked by the state. According to the state's evidence, all the vital organs of Mrs. Murphy were in a healthy condition, and it is contended that by a "process of elimination," embolism caused death.

Dr. Geary was cross-examined relative to an examination made of the spine, when the body was exhumed ten days after burial, and found in a normal condition.

The cross-examination of medical men by the defense is expected to take the remainder of the day.

The defense is expected to call doctors to testify that incidents are not infrequent when the causes of death are undetectable, and to contest the "embolism theory" of the state.

Another phase of the defense will be that what the state holds was a severe beating, was a "spanking," and insufficient in itself to be fatal.

The trial is expected to last the greater portion of this week, and at each session the courtroom is packed with spectators.

PLAN CHRISTMAS OPENING TOMORROW

At two minutes after seven tomorrow night, after the Medford business district has been in darkness for two minutes, the lights will blaze forth upon beautiful Christmas-time window displays, one of the main features of the Christmas opening which will be celebrated tomorrow. And visitors in Medford tomorrow may expect the most elaborate and attractive displays that have yet been prepared for a holiday season in this city. Medford merchants have been planning tomorrow's opening for several weeks and their window displays will represent much thought and effort.

Tomorrow night's opening will bring people to Medford from all parts of the Rogue River valley. J. D. Russell, A. E. Orr and H. B. Strang are in charge of the celebration which will officially open the Christmas season here. According to the members of this committee, the famous D. O. K. K. band has been secured to play on the principal corners of the business district and hundreds of free toys will be distributed to the boys and girls. Old Santa Claus will be on hand for the opening, making his headquarters at the Chamber of Commerce building where he will give toys to the children between the hours of 6:30 and 7:30. Medford store windows will be covered tomorrow, until 7:02, when they will be unveiled for the public.

CONSECRATION OF CHURCH IS HELD

Services for the consecration of the Episcopal church were held yesterday with Bishop Water T. Sumner of Portland in attendance and before a large congregation. The consecration celebrates the fact that all outstanding church debts have been settled following its erection in 1916. A feature of the ritual service, never before witnessed here, was the cope and mitre worn by the bishop. The cope is a cloak covering the entire body and is of historical significance, while the mitre is a head dress studded with precious stones. The "Instrument of Donation," putting the bishop in full religious control of the church in which a promise is made that the church is not to be used for secular purposes, was given to Bishop Sumner by Charles Strang, vestryman. Following this prayer for the different phases of religious life were made and then a prayer for the consecration. After the "Sentence of Consecration" was read by Rev. W. B. Hamilton, the services closed.

C. M. TUCKER HURT WHEN SCAFFOLDING FALLS

It will be six or eight weeks, according to Mrs. Tucker, before C. M. Tucker will be able to be on his feet again, following a 12-foot fall last Friday morning when a scaffolding gave way on the east side, now in the course of construction. Three men were precipitated to the ground by the break, the other two being Bert Newman and Arthur Heine. They, however, were not injured, while Tucker received a severely sprained ankle. A short time before a like accident occurred on the same house, which sent a Mr. Demoret to the Sacred Heart hospital suffering from severe bone fractures.

PENDLETON CELEBRATES CHURCH ANNIVERSARY

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 30.—The fiftieth anniversary of the building of the Episcopal and Methodist Episcopal churches in Pendleton was celebrated here yesterday in a joint golden jubilee anniversary celebration. Each church held its own service in the morning while they united for a joint service in the evening. Right Rev. Lemuel H. Wells, retired Episcopal bishop, who now lives in Tacoma and J. B. Horner, professor of history at Oregon Agricultural college, delivered the addresses. Bishop Wells held the first church service here in 1871 and founded the present Church of the Redeemer, while J. B. Horner's father, E. R. Horner, circuit rider and carpenter, built the first M. E. church in 1875.
