FIRPO DECIDES TO RE-ENTER RING IN FINAL COME-BACK

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—Luis Angel Firpo, the Argentine heavyweight champion, is about to stage a return to the pugilistic arena in the United States.

"I will go back to the United States and re-enter the boxing game, ready to fight any adversary who may present himself until I have once more clinched a bout with Jack Dempsey," said Firpo.

Many months after he was beaten by Dempsey in the Polo Grounds, Firpo said he was not convinced that Dempsey is a better man.

"The brave bull of the pampas," as Firpo is known here, has used much of his time in selling American automobiles and accessories. Just now he is engaged in portraying the hero in a motion picture which is being filmed in Buenos Aires. His business activities have kept him so busy that he has rejected all offers to fight, notwithstanding tempting purses.

He intends to leave Argentina next March. He will go first to London and take on all comers. He will then go to Canada before visiting the United States.

Word from Los Angeles is that Jack Dempsey is willing to give Firpo another fight with Los Angeles the battleground. Dempsey said the fight could take place before he meets Wills in July.

OTTO TAKES HORRIBLE BEATING FROM MICKEY ROCKSON IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—Mickey Rockson won from Otto Robinson in the light heavyweight main event fight here last night in the ninth round when Referee Gruman stopped the fight. Robinson was knocked down six times, once for the count of nine in the first round, once for a nine count in the third round and again in the same round for a count of seven, twice for the nine finger salute in the ninth frame and then for the final fumble when the referee refused to count any more.

Ted Framey of Seattle took a six-round decision from Speed Murphy of Portland in the semi-windup, a eight-heavyweight scrap.

BULLDOGGING IN LOS ANGELES IS OUTLAWED

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—This time one wild western city has cut another tie that bound it to the wild west.

Hereafter rodeos held within the city limits will be less wild, the department of humane treatment of animals has decided.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 1.—Though the Oregon Aggie football team works more as a unit than as an aggregation of individual stars, a number of the most colorful players on the coast will be in orange jerseys for the final game of the season against Southern California Saturday.

Paul Snider, fullback, has consistently out-punted all opponents this season, making the surprising average against Idaho of 53 yards to each boot. One kick from his own nine yard line sailed seventy yards through the air from the line of scrimmage and rolled for a total of 119 yards from the kicker. Snider will play his final game for the Aggies this week.

Schulmerich has neither missed a try for point nor a place kick this season, and in addition he passes, receives, runs the ends, plunges and can punt if necessary. Dixon and Dickerson, tackles, have each been included in all coast selections this year, while Edwards and Luby, quarter and half, have not failed to make sensational open field gains in every game this season.
