

LAWYER FAILS TO OUST COURT MARTIAL JUDGE

Mitchell Hearing Thrown Into Uproar By Charges and Counter Charges — Reid Demands Removal of Gen. Graves From Court.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—A clash which caused the court to be closed temporarily developed in the Mitchell court martial today between representative Frank R. Reid, defense counsel, and Major General William Graves, a member of the court, who was charged by Reid with interrupting his cross-examination of a witness.

General Graves had made some remark about Reid's methods of cross-examination, but when the defense attorney protested the general replied that he had not interrupted the proceedings, the court retired to consider the question.

Last Friday Brigadier General Edward L. King, another member of the court, was accused by Reid of remarking in an undertone from the bench that the defense testimony then being heard was "damn rot."

When today's flare-up occurred, Captain H. E. Yarnell of the navy was being cross-examined by Reid about the Hawaiian flight, and Major Allen Tullion, assistant trial judge advocate, had complained to the court of Reid's "insulting treatment" of witnesses.

The decision followed another fiery altercation in open court, arising from a comment made in an undertone by general Graves regarding the method of the defense attorney, Representative Reid of Illinois, in his questioning of witnesses.

When the lawyer made his accusation the general denied that he had interrupted the questioning or had shown any partiality.

The president of the court, Major General Robert L. Howze, told counsel on both sides to desist from "disgraceful wrangling" and to address the court and not each other, but Representative Reid refused to be quieted.

"I hereby shall challenge General Graves to sit longer as a member of this court for the reason that his actions while on this court show that he is not impartial and that in justice and fairness to the accused, General Graves should no longer be permitted to sit as a member of this court."

INSULL MEDAL TO BE PRESENTED AT FORUM TONIGHT

The first Insull medal to be awarded to anyone in the entire northwest will be presented tonight to a local man, Howard Dyanan of the California Oregon Power Co. Mr. Dyanan won this signal honor through his prompt and efficient resuscitation of a fellow employe, Iurt Green of Klamath Falls after he had been severely shocked through contact with a 34,000 volt switch.

Mr. Dyanan's noteworthy act brought recognition from Samuel Insull, president of the Commonwealth Edison Co., of Chicago who instituted the Insull Medal award in 1923.

The presentation will be made at the Copeco Forum meeting tonight and it is expected that the capacity of the company's assembly room will be taxed to its utmost to accommodate the crowd.

CITY BUDGET FOR 1926 IS ADOPTED

The final action on the city budget was taken by the city council last night when that body passed an ordinance making the annual tax levy for the year 1926 to provide for the estimated expenses of \$92,696 for the operation of the city during the ensuing year.

STATE RESTS IN O. MURPHY CASE

The state rested at noon in the trial of O. W. Murphy, charged with manslaughter, as the result of the death of his wife last spring, and motion of the defense for a directed verdict was denied by the court.

Prof. Benson of the University of Oregon medical school, a recognized authority on the embolism, was the last witness for the state. He testified in response to a hypothetical question that death was due, in his opinion, from an embolism, "most likely in the lungs."
