FIND REMAINS OF 'GODDESS' IN SAHARA DESERT

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—The Franco-American expedition in the Sahara, headed by Count Byron Kuhn de Protok, has discovered the skeleton of a personage buried in the tomb of Tim Hinan, the legendary goddess and ancestress of the Tuaregs, says a dispatch today to the New York Times from Abalema Hogkan in the Sahara desert.

The bones of a well-built person about six feet in height, whose fine features resemble those of present day Tuareg nobles, were found resting on an elaborate couch sunk in solid rock, the dispatch stated. This was surrounded by bags of grain, grapes and dates, food for the journey into the other world.

The scientists were unable to determine whether the bones were those of a man or a woman, but the natives were convinced they were those of Tim Hinan herself.

The skull had feminine characteristics, but the body bones were apparently of a masculine type. It is thought possible that the expedition has found the body of the ancient heroine who is the root and whole structure of Tuareg mythology.

The weapons usually buried with persons of high rank were not found. Garments of a dignitary were found in an anteroom of the burial chamber. Beads, carnelians, garnets and objects of gold and silver were dug up in the mound covering the skeleton. The beads, which were similar to those of the third and fourth centuries found in the temple of Tanit at Carthage, gave the first clue to the date of the tomb.

Massive bracelets on the arms of the skeleton were believed to be of gold and silver alloyed with another metal, probably antimony, which was used by the Carthaginians to give gold and silver jewelry additional weight and hardness.

1000 CARS CANADIAN SPUDS LOWER PRICE

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—(A. P.)—Imports of potatoes from Canada, duty paid, have again increased and at nearly all the United States city markets as well as at rural shipping points the wholesale price of potatoes is lower than a week ago.

Approximately one thousand carloads of Canadian potatoes have been brought into the United States so far this season, according to a report today to the government bureau of agricultural economics.

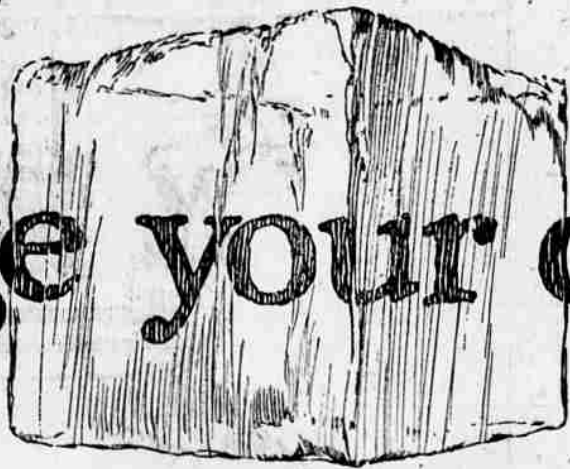
