## AGGIES GIVEN A GREAT SEND-OFF FOR FINAL GAME

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 3.—Cheered on by the shouts of a rousing student rally, 26 Oregon Aggie grid men left yesterday for Los Angeles, where they are expecting the closest game of the season with the Trojans and are determined to throw their full strength into the fray to bring victory over the Californians.

Every man is in the best of condition excepting Ward, end, who will not be used unless his ability as a pass receiver is absolutely necessary in a crisis.

The starting lineup will probably be Hollins and Logan, ends; Dixon and Dickerson, tackles; Reichert and Hadley, guards; Halcom, center; Edwards, quarter; Schulmerich and Denman, halves; and Snider, fullback. Snider will be playing his last game for O. A. C., and should be at the peak of his ability.

Some new plays and other little needed in previous games have been perfected in the past two weeks, and a powerful and probably spectacular offense is expected to feature the Aggie play.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 3.—(A. P.)—The University of Southern California varsity backfield will undoubtedly present a changed appearance in the game with Oregon Agricultural college Saturday, from that seen by fans during the last four games played by the Trojans.

Two broken toes suffered by Honey Earl will keep the halfback star on the bench. With Henry Lefebvre in good shape for the fullback berth, it was indicated today that Manuel Laraneta will fill Earl's position with Morley Drury at left half and Bill Cook at quarter.

In the event either of his halfbacks fall Saturday, Coach Howard Jones will shove in Newton Stark, end, whom he has been grooming for several days.

## HOREMANS WINS BILLIARD TITLE FROM SCHAEFER

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—Edouard Horemans, Belgian master of the billiard cue, is the world's champion 18.2 ball line billiard player. He won the title from young Jake Schaefer, 1509 to 1495, despite a run of 432 made by the former champion in his desperate effort to retain the crown. The final night's score was: Schaefer 582; Horemans 600. Play of 500 point nightly blocks began Monday.

Schaefer has a chance to recover within thirty days, for he made the stipulation that the winner should meet the loser within the period as a condition of his appearance last night. He previously had threatened to quit because of objection to a decision of Referee J. Herbert Levy.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—Ted Thye, Portland light heavy-weight wrestler, took two straight falls from Frank Burns, Flint, Mich., wrestler here last night. 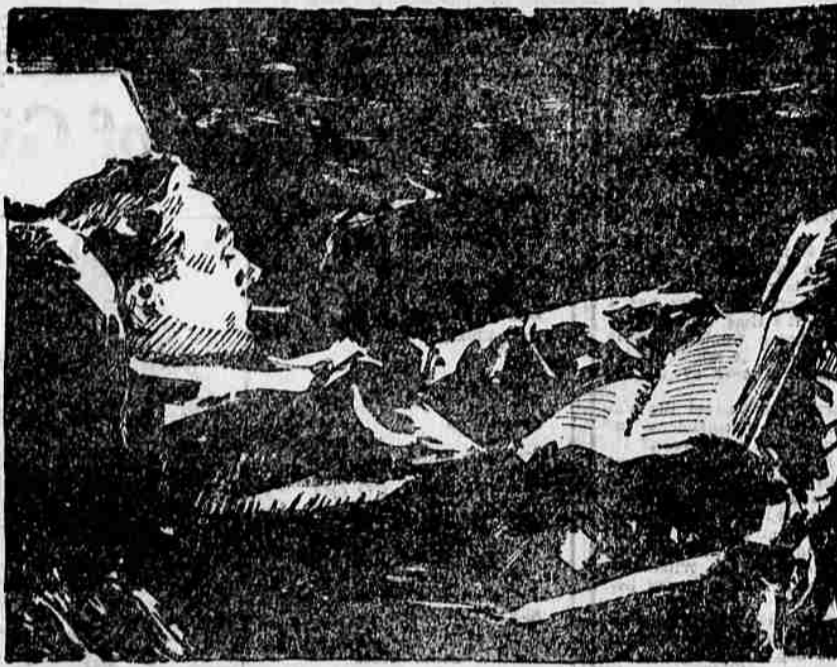
## FOOTBALL OVERDONE HARVARD U. BELIEVES
