PRESIDENT MUCH PLEASED BY PEACE WORK IN CHURCHES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—President Coolidge has conveyed expressions of his gratification on the convening of the national study conference on churches and world peace that the churches are "giving themselves to this sober study of these vital themes."

The president's belief that its findings will be of deep interest and "cannot fail to be of large value," was conveyed to the conference in a letter to Bishop William McDowell of Washington, chairman of the conference, which is being attended by representatives of 30 communions. Formulation of plans for an educational campaign through the churches in behalf of world peace is described as the purpose of the meeting.

"Of course no one group can alone solve the whole problem of world peace," the president said in his letter. "It cannot be solved without the active participation of the churches, but it cannot be solved by them alone. All lovers of and believers in the better order must work each in his own field and way to secure the desired end. All these forces must work harmoniously and earnestly together."

"The churches are among the most potent agencies upon which we must depend. They have a place all their own in the making of that mental and spiritual attitude within the nations and between the nations in which governments can go forward to a world of law and order, peace and reason. We shall not find this an easy task and it will require the co-operation of schools and courts, press and homes, governments and churches to bring about the great results."

PIERCE DEFENDS REFUSAL TO AID BAKER PROJECT

SALEM, Dec. 3.—That the irrigated and drained areas must feed the increasing eating world and that brighter days are ahead for the people who produce the things that the world must eat and wear were the thoughts emphasized by Governor Pierce in addressing the drainage association at the noon luncheon today.

"The time is just around the corner," said the governor, "when the whole country is going to need more foodstuffs. Twenty-four years ago I predicted that the time would come when this country would consume 550,000,000 bushels of wheat. Last year we consumed over 600,000,000 bushels."

The governor emphasized the significance of the "tremendous increase in population every year." He admitted that the state had gone too far with irrigation with an insufficient demand for that development, but declared the necessity for drainage is without question.

"Underground tiling will ultimately be the thing all over the Willamette valley," he said, "and even far beyond the valley."

The governor defended the declaration he made to Secretary Hubert Work of the department of the interior, that he would not vote to put state money into the Baker project, although he said he had been severely censured for his stand. The state could not afford to do it, he said, because there would be no interest forthcoming on the money, while the government would receive a return for its money.

The governor endorsed the movement which took definite shape today for a union of the drainage association with the Oregon Reclamation congress.

Because the proposed union between the two organizations will terminate the office of Sam H. Brown of Marion county as president of the drainage association the association remembered Mr. Brown today by the gift of a costly fountain pen. The gift was presented by E. E. Chadwick, secretary of the Eugene chamber of commerce.

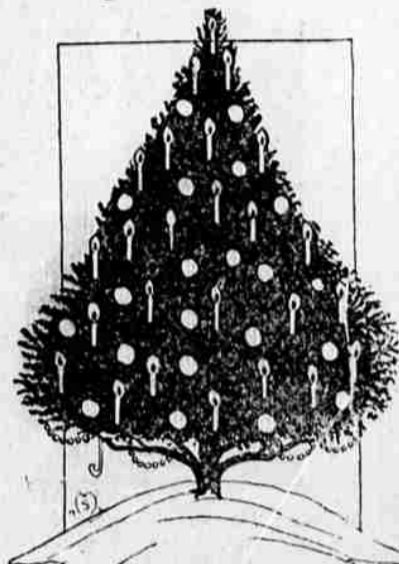

WILBUR REFUSES TO TAKE HIS OLD JOB

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—(A.P.) Secretary Wilbur declined today a tender of the chief justiceship of the supreme court of California. The offer came from Governor Richardson. The chief justiceship recently became vacant by resignation of the incumbent judge. The offer is understood to have been received Saturday while Mr. Wilbur was at the army-navy football game in New York.

Both Mr. Wilbur and the White House have recently denied that the secretary planned to leave the cabinet. The judgeship which he declined is the one he held at the time of his appointment as secretary of the navy.

JACK KEARNS FINED FOR BORDER RUMPUS

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—Jack Kearns, former manager of Jack Dempsey was fined \$250 by Justice Lloyd Griffin this morning on a charge of disturbing the peace at the international border last Friday night. One hundred and fifty dollars of the fine was suspended, however, on condition that Kearns violate no laws for six months.

Arresting officers testified that Kearns refused to pull out of line of traffic when ordered to do so and that he abused them. F. J. Dixon, said to be an attorney of Los Angeles, appeared in court for Kearns who was said to be ill.

MEETING OF WETS IN JANUARY PROTESTED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—(A.P.)—A protest against the admission to the United States of foreign delegates to the conference here January 16, described as being under the auspices of the "wets" was sent to Secretary Kellogg today by the National Prohibition committee in session here. The Association Against the Prohibition Amendment is scheduled to gather here on that date.

The committee also formulated a program directed towards the defeat of certain men now in office. D. Leigh Colvin of New York was chosen chairman of the committee and M. Len Hutchins of Los Angeles as vice chairman.
