

FRED STEIWER, SENATE ASPIRANT, VISITS IN CITY

Frederick Steiwer, well known young Pendleton attorney and candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator, who is making a swing through southern Oregon getting acquainted with the voters, spent yesterday, last night and this morning here and the remainder of today in Ashland and Klamath Falls, and will return to Medford from the latter city tomorrow evening.

While Mr. Steiwer is not well known in southern Oregon as yet, he is not a total stranger here, for he has many friends among Medford young men who served in the 45th artillery during the world war, as he served with that command from the time it was sent near the front in France until the war's end.

The Pendleton attorney is the youngest of the several senatorial candidates, has a pleasing personality, declares he is in the race to the finish and will make an active campaign from now on. He expresses the belief that Portland and the eastern part of the state, with the possible exception of the southeastern counties, will be largely for him, and also that he will draw much strength in the Willamette valley section, where he has a considerable acquaintance.
