

NEW CHRISTIAN CHURCH BUILDING TO OPEN SUNDAY

The new building being erected by the First Christian church is nearly completed and will soon be ready for dedication.

A "Home Coming day" with an all day program is announced for Sunday Dec. 13. The committee in charge has set a mark for 500 in the Bible school for that day, and expects a great gathering for the entire day's program. Invitations are being sent out to many friends who formerly resided here to come and spend the day. A basket dinner will be served in the spacious new dining hall at noon to which all are cordially invited.

At 3 p. m. there will be a good fellowship meeting in which the ministers of the city and visiting friends will have a part.

The new building which has been under construction only two months is two stories with an equal floor space to the old building and gives to this growing congregation one of the best plants for the young people in their social and religious life, and for educational work found in this section.

The first floor has large recreational and dining hall well lighted and heated, beautiful and made home-like by a large fireplace, and the ladies of the church are delighted with the spacious kitchen completely equipped for convenience and comfort.

The second floor which opens into the main auditorium has eight individual classrooms accommodating all the junior department of the Bible school with a capacity of more than 200 pupils.

The members and friends of the church are very much delighted with the much needed addition and have responded to the appeal for finances in a way so that the larger part of the cost has already been raised. The plan of the finance committee is to pay the entire cost within one year.
