

### MAKE FINAL AWARDS GRADE SCHOOL POSTURE CONTEST NEXT WEEK

Posture tests made in the grades of the Medford schools are about completed and an announcement of the winning school will be made next week. The tests are being arranged on a percentage basis.

Each child in the grade schools has been or will be placed in one of four posture classes: Class A—Children maintaining good posture while standing, marching and exercising; Class B—While standing and marching; Class C—While standing; Class D—Poor posture at all times. The winning school will be the school having the largest per cent of children maintaining Class A posture. Within each school there will be a smaller test for the grade having best posture.

The award, a silver loving cup, has been placed in the Fogarty window. In order to win this cup to keep it permanently it is necessary to earn the honors three consecutive times.

The results of recent posture tests conducted in the high school physical training classes showed clearly that the sophomore girls had claim to the honor of being the class with best posture.

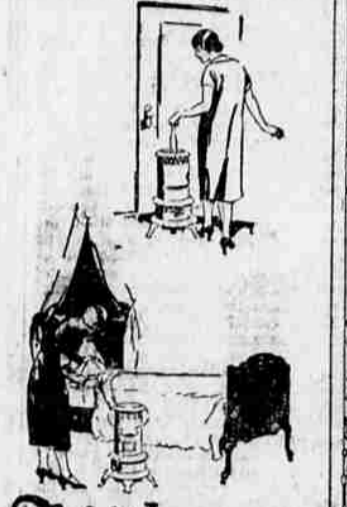
### Turks Again Reported Ready to Fight English
