"My averill found southern Oregon sportsmen in a controversy over the advisability of closing Rogue river to steelhead fishing after December 1," says the Oregonian. The present law, under an opinion rendered by the attorney general, permits fishing for steelhead trout of 15 inches and over anywhere in the state during the winter season."
