# MOTHER SHOT IN LEG WHEN RIFLE IS DISCHARGED

Mrs. Mimie Norman, about 40, of Jacksonville, is suffering from the effects of a .22 rifle shot wound in the leg, inflicted last evening at 8:20 when the gun discharged accidentally in the hands of her 16-year-old son, Lloyd. She will be confined to her home for ten days or more, according to the attending physician, Dr. C. T. Sweeney.

The bullet, a .22 short, penetrated a short distance below the knee, barely missing the bone and artery. The wound bled profusely before being stopped by a tourniquet. At the time of the accident the boy is said to have been playing with the gun, as he had been doing all afternoon.

Mrs. Norman, who is a widow with three children, is employed at a local hotel, where she had worked for the past eight months without missing one day.
