NOTRE DAME AND NEBRASKA BREAK, BLAME GAMBLERS

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Dec. 9.—(A. P.) The University of Notre Dame and Nebraska have broken off athletic relations after a conference between officials of the two schools.

While Knute Rockne, Notre Dame athletic director, would make no statement, Coach Ernest Bearg of Nebraska, in Lincoln, said disgruntled gamblers who lost on the 17 to 0 defeat of Notre Dame Thanksgiving day were primarily responsible.

Reports here said a hostile spirit had existed between the schools for several years and had been fanned before and after the 1925 game by treatment accorded Notre Dame players by Lincoln, Neb., townspeople.

Bearg denied that the players had been insulted or humiliated and pointed to Rockne's assertion before the game that the ovation given the team was the greatest Notre Dame had ever experienced.

"The whole affair, to my mind, has been brought about by deception work, by persons who lost heavily on the game," said Bearg. "I regret Notre Dame officials were influenced but that school and not Nebraska will have the explaining to do when the facts are known."

SPORT BRIEFS

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—(A. P.) Promoters of New York's first professional football team—Tim Mara, Dr. Harry March and Billy Gusson—propose that the National League of Football clubs adopt a rule preventing a team in the league from using college players until eight months after he has played his last college game.

The New York men feel that something drastic should be done to curb the criticism directed at the professional game since Red Grange and Earl Britton joined the Chicago Bears.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 9.—(A. P.) The Oregon Aggies will meet the Marquette university football eleven next Thanksgiving day. It was announced here yesterday when the Aggies returned from their trip to Los Angeles where they met the University of Southern California. The Marquette game will be played at Milwaukee, November 25.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 9.—Charles High, outfielder, and Dave Keefe, pitcher, have been sold to the Buffalo club of the International league by the Portland club of the Pacific Coast Baseball league.

Catcher Woodring, who was on option last season to the Martinsburg, Va., club of the Blue Ridge league, has been transferred on option to the Waterbury club of the Eastern league.

Thomas L. Turner, president of the Portland club, sent this information today by wire from New York.

Paavo Nurmi, Finnish track marvel, who swept all Americans except Alan Jeffrich before him last winter and spring, will return to America for another indoor campaign next winter, according to information from Finland.

The New York state athletic commission's investigators report that Jack Delaney of Bridgeport, Conn., is in perfect shape for his battle with the light-heavyweight champion, Paul Berlenbach, in New York Friday night.

CHAMPION FIDDLER OF MAINE GIVES HENRY SNOWSHOES

DETROIT, Dec. 9.—(A. P.) "Melie" Dunham, Maine's champion fiddler, who arrived with his wife from Norway, Maine, late yesterday to visit Henry Ford was at the Dearborn country club today.

The fiddler and his wife, who have been attracting much notice since he was invited to come to Detroit, were waiting to be told the plans Mr. Ford had for their entertainment while in the city. Before retiring early last night, Mr. Dunham said that he was as much ignorant of the program for his visit as the general public and the only announcement vouchsafed by the Ford organization was that there might be a statement issued by Mr. Ford today.

Arriving late yesterday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Dunham were met at the railroad station by an assistant secretary from Mr. Ford's personal staff. He whisked them into an automobile and started them for Dearborn, completely ignoring a corps of newspapermen who had journeyed all the way from Maine with the couple.

The fiddler, his fiddle under one arm and a pair of snowshoes under the other, was taken directly to the Ford offices at Dearborn, where they were shown through the plant and where they met Mr. Ford. The only report of the meeting was that given by Dunham last night. He said Mr. Ford said he was "glad to see him," and the fiddler returned the greeting and presented him with the snowshoes he had made for him.

Ford then, according to Dunham's report given over the telephone from the country club, told them he wanted them to have a good rest and sent them to the Dearborn country club. The fiddler was loud in his praise of the "supper" he had at the club last night, asserting it was the best one he had ever eaten and was highly appreciative of the attention he was being given.

TWO VERSIONS TOLD TRAGIC INCIDENT IN STRIKE AREA

PITTSBURG, Dec. 9.—Authorities of Allegheny and Washington counties are investigating two occurrences in open shop mining camps of the Pittsburgh Coal company, near here, last night, one of which resulted in a woman being crushed to death under a truck, and the other an explosion which wrecked the dwelling of a miner. In the latter instance the miner and his family of five escaped unhurt.

Contradictory claims were put forth by coal company officials and Sheriff G. R. Woodside of Allegheny county on one side and the United Mine Workers on the other.

The truck ploughed into a group of persons, causing the death of Mrs. George Timko, 44, and the injury of another woman, a deputy sheriff and the truck driver.

The contention of the mine company spokesman is that as the commissary truck neared a group of persons gathered near Montour No. 19 mine at Labrary, the driver was attacked, stones being hurled at the truck, one of which shattered the windshield, causing him to lose control of the vehicle.

P. T. Fagin, president of district No. 5 of the union, charged that the driver "deliberately drove into the crowd" while traveling at a high rate of speed. Fagin also said that following the incident deputy sheriffs sent to the mine, three-quarters of a mile away, fired "15 or 20 shots and used tear gas to disperse the crowd."

Sheriff Woodside denied that his deputies either discharged their guns or used tear gas.

The explosion took place at Midland mine, near Canonsburg, Washington county. The wrecked house, a company statement said, had been occupied by the family of a union miner who had not been employed at the mine after it resumed operations after the 1917 wage scale settlement.

UPSTATE ROTARIANS IN JOLLIFICATION MEET

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 9.—Rotarians from Eugene and Roseburg joined last evening in a jollification meeting here. Women of Rotary were present to aid in the fun-making.

Due to an accident in which Pete Smedley, former president of Rotary International, was injured while en route to Eugene, Smedley was unable to be here. The meeting had been arranged principally for his scheduled address.

R. A. Booth of Eugene welcomed the Roseburg Rotarians while J. M. McClintock gave the response for the guests. Al Reynolds, president of the Portland Rotary club gave the principal address of the evening.

KLAMATH FALLS.—A strange malady is killing off antelope by the hundreds in the desert country above Lakeview, Pat Casey, stockman of that section said. Casey reported finding scores of carcasses of stricken antelope lying on the open ground.

SAN FRANCISCO.—Voluntary contributions from French residents here to help their country in the present financial situation are being received at the French-American bank here. The contributions are part of a national movement.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 6.—Norman Burke, 6, of Pelican City, a suburb, died last night at a local hospital from spinal meningitis. The lad was taken violently ill while attending school last week. This makes the second death from the disease this week. There are no other cases in the county and health authorities are hopeful there will be no epidemic.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 9.—Arthur Ames, charged jointly with C. K. McCarthy with stealing \$120 from Larry Robinson, was found not guilty in the verdict of a jury last night. The jurors deliberated less than two hours. McCarthy was convicted last week and sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 9.—Yeggs last night blew open the large safe of the city creamery and made away with about \$10.85 as a result of their expert job on the heavy safe door. Entrance was gained by jimmying open a rear window. Footprints in the place indicated there were two safe-blowers at work. Authorities today were attempting to procure fingerprints.

WHITHER BUDGET MONEY GOES AND WHENCE DERIVED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—(A. P.) The story of where the government's money comes from and where it goes, in terms of the average dollar was told today in estimates for 1927 submitted by the budget bureau as follows:

Where it comes from:
Income and profits tax 49.76 cents; miscellaneous internal revenue 22.85 cents; customs revenue 14.33 cents; interest, premium and discount 4.95 cents; fees, fines, penalties and forfeitures 0.84 84 cents; repayments on investments 1.82 cents; trust fund receipts 2.16 cents and other miscellaneous receipts 3.22 cents.

Where it goes:
General functions of government 3.35 cents; national defense 16.32 cents; military pensions, retirement pay, annuities, World war allowance and life insurance claims 16.55 cents; public works 5.60 cents; promotion, regulation and operation of marine transportation 1.88 cents; other civil functions 7.40 cents; refunds 4.91 cents; public debt retirement from ordinary receipts 14.76 cents; interest on public debt 22.75 cents; and trust funds 6.48 cents.

Who spends it:
Legislative establishment 0.46 cents; executive office 0.91 cent; veterans bureau 10.52 cents; other independent establishments 1.61 cents; agriculture 4.33 cents; commerce 0.86 cents; interior 7.66 cents; justice (including judicial) 0.70 cent; labor 0.25 cent; navy 9.55 cents; deficiency in postal revenues 0.71 cent; state 0.47 cent; treasury 8.78 cents; public debt retirement 14.76 cents; interest on public debt 22.75 cents; investment of trust funds 5.60 cents; war, including Panama canal 9.94 cents; District of Columbia 1.04 cents.
