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D. M. LOWE FINDS LONG-LOST KIN IN YREKA HOSPITAL

Separated from each other for 26 years, during over 16 years of which time neither knew where the other was living, D. M. Lowe, well known local rancher, and Lucian Lowe, his brother, were reunited Sunday morning at the Yreka hospital, in Yreka, Cal.

In 1859 in Ukiah, Cal., Lucian arrived for a visit with his brother, who was at that time operating a theater in Ukiah. At that time Lucian was to have been married to a Ukiah girl, whom he had known for years.

After attending the theater one evening, Lucian suddenly disappeared and for 16 years no member of his family knew of his whereabouts. He then got in touch with D. M. Lowe, and although the brothers corresponded for several years, they never met.

Finally the correspondence ceased and for a period of four or five years D. M. heard nothing of his brother's whereabouts.

Last Friday the local man received word from Yreka that a man whose name was Lowe had been taken to the Yreka hospital, suffering from an attack of paralysis. The latter had been found at the forks of Salmon river, in northern California, and unable to speak because of the stroke, was unable to give his name or the names of relatives.

Men who knew him in Yreka identified him, but were unable to give the names of relatives. D. M. made a trip to Yreka Sunday morning and identified the man as the brother who had been missing for 26 years.

Lucian was brought to the Lowe ranch near this city, where it is said he is improving in health rapidly. And again, the Lowe brothers, inseparable companions in their youth, are united.—Ashland Tidings.

TOP GRADE EGGS ON PRICE DECLINE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 9.—(A. P.) Top grade eggs continue on the lower trend in the local market with receipts improving as the shipping outlet grows narrower.

Other grades held steady but grading lacked snap and was confined largely to the long. Most of the jobbers are well supplied and offerings are plentiful with more or less price shading.

Storage holdings of eggs on the coast are gradually being reduced, although a considerable surplus is still showing over a year ago.

Portland holdings amount to 17,798 cases as compared to 23,075 cases a week ago.

Butter prices are declining in the local dairy exchange. Primes and firsts are off a cent at 50 and 48 cents respectively. Standards and firsts remain unchanged.

The print and butterfat markets are also steady and unchanged for the day.

BAN JOHNSON GIVEN SALARY INCREASE

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—(A. P.) Baneroff B. Johnson, president of the American League, was given a salary increase of \$10,000 today at the meeting of the league officials.

His yearly pay was raised from \$30,000 to \$40,000 and his contract which terminated in 1925, extended to 1929.

The league officials voted against any change in the pitching rules, which would permit the use of resin by pitchers and instructed its scheduled committee to vote against the National League's suggestion to play inter-sectional games on holidays.

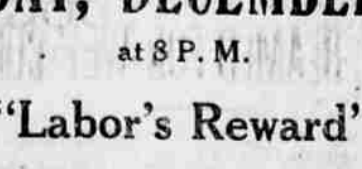
