Resolved, that Medford-Ashland Typographical Union, No. 559, pledge its loyalty to home merchants and discourage the practice of mail order patronage, except in cases where

goods desired cannot be obtained locally. Be it further

Resolved, that we call attention of local merchants to the fact that Medford has several good job printing establishments, equipped for all kinds of commercial printing, except lithographing and book binding; that their prices are as reasonable as elsewhere, and the printers who do the work are their patrons, and that a majority of our membership spend one hundred cents of every dollar they earn for Medford purchased commodities.

PARIS AIR SPY PLOT BLOWS UP, GIRL IS A LIAR

PARIS, Dec. 10.—(A. P.)—The famous air service espionage case is now admitted to be a "mare's nest" by the same newspapers which made charges that Great Britain employed that, despite diligent search, they have found no evidence whatever to support the confession made by Mlle. Marthe Moreuil that she had been spying in the employ of James Fletcher, Ernest O. Phillip and William Fischer, who were declared to be former British officers and now in the intelligence department of Great Britain.

The three men are expected to be released immediately.

PRESIDENT FAVORS AIR COMMITTEE REPORT PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Creation of a bureau of air navigation in the department of commerce to regulate and encourage commercial aviation, and a policy of aircraft development in the light of the loss of the Shenandoah and extension of the air mail service to all sections of the country were recommended in the report submitted to congress today by the national advisory committee for aeronautics.

Endorsing the report in a letter of transmittal, President Coolidge declared a statement by the committee that "America is at least abreast of other progressive nations in the technical development of aircraft for mil-

itary purposes," should "dispel the impression" that this country is lagging. The committee's opinion was recommended to congress as "the most authoritative that can be had."

The president agreed with the committee that "substantial progress in aeronautics is dependent largely upon scientific research," and added:

"I believe that the work of the committee is the most fundamental activity of the government in connection with the development of aeronautics and that its continuance is essential if America is to maintain its present advanced position in aircraft development."

The condition of the aircraft industry and the prospects for the development of commercial aviation on a sound basis have materially improved during the past year. To encourage development of commercial aviation I wish especially to endorse the recommendation of the committee for the creation of a bureau of air navigation in the "department of commerce."

HARRISBURG BRIDGE OVER WILLAMETTE OPENED TO TRAFFIC

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—State Highway Engineer Roy Klein announces that the new \$200,000 bridge over the Willamette river at Harrisburg will be opened to traffic today. The bridge is the last Willamette river bridge on the Pacific Highway and will take the place of the Harrisburg ferry that has been in use for years.

Construction of the bridge has been under way for the last eighteen months. The bridge has three 180-foot spans, making the total length 540 feet, but with the addition of approach construction the length stretches out to 1,600 feet. The bridge is of concrete and steel.

The new bridge is expected to increase traffic over the east side route of the Pacific highway.
