

O. A. C. AND EUGENE DEBATE TO A TIE FOR SECOND TIME

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 10.—The first debate of the forensic schedule for the University of Oregon, held yesterday at Corvallis and Eugene resulted in a tie for the second time in two years. The affirmative team, which debated in Villard hall here yesterday for Oregon against the O. A. C. negative team, won by a unanimous vote. The Oregon negative team lost at Corvallis by the same unanimous decision of the judges. This placed the final score of the afternoon at Oregon, four and four. Benoit McCracken and Beryl V. Ludington of the Oregon affirmative team, advocating that the nations immediately relinquish governmental control in China, won easily from Frank DeSpain and Mark Evans, upholding the negative for the Corvallis institution.

Before two-thirds of the entire O. A. C. student body, which numbered more than 2000 a meeting at which Governor Pierce was the presiding chairman, Oregon's team, composed of Herschel Brown and Jack McGuire, was defeated decisively by the Aggie affirmative team, made up of Blair Stewart and Harold Bell.

ANTI-DRYS FAVOR LAW ENFORCEMENT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(A.P.)—Opponents of prohibition broke into the newly stirred up wet and dry controversy again today, the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment calling for a "show down" on the question, and the granting to Assistant Secretary Andrews of the treasury "every power and every weapon he asks for."

A statement, issued by W. H. Stanton, national chairman of the association, gave qualified approval to the provision in the new tax bill taxing cereal beverages of less than one-half of one per cent alcoholic content and denounced suggestions for an amendment increasing the limit to two and three-quarters per cent.

The association would favor the present tax provision, the statement continued. If General Andrews wanted it to "help him try out his experiment of endeavoring to enforce the Volstead law."

"By all means," the association concluded, "let us have a 'show down'."

BORAH AGAIN ASKS SOVIET RECOGNITION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee today introduced a resolution calling for the recognition of the Russian soviet government by the United States. At his request action was postponed.

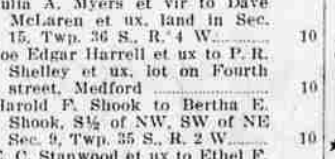
