**PLANT BIG TRACT TO PEACH, CHERRY AND APRICOT TREES**

GOLD HILL, Dec. 11.—Mr. and Mrs. Dean Kellogg Stacy of the east Medford district were in Gold Hill during the week on legal matters. They are buying an unimproved tract of land in the Crestbrook Orchard tract east of Medford and preparing to plant this winter the entire tract with peach, cherry, and apricot fruit trees. He reports that these are the coming fruit for the valley in supplying the eastern Oregon and Klamath county markets, and that a very large acreage of these fruits will be planted this winter on new lands and that which has heretofore been in bearing apple tracts. Mr. Stacy and his father, Chas. D. Stacy, formerly of Sams Valley are also owners of a very profitable bearing pear orchard on the old Fred Barnsbury tract east of Medford.

Attorney George W. Cherry, formerly of Medford and associated with B. F. Mulkey and A. E. Kellogg in the law business at Medford and Gold Hill in writing to Gold Hill friends reports that he has been located in Wallowa, Oregon the past several years since leaving Medford practicing law at Wallowa. He also reports that he still has a longing for sunny Rogue River valley, that a thriving business and the many advantages of Wallowa valley will probably keep him there permanently. L. C. Richmond, now a resident of Gold Hill for the past several years is an old resident of Wallowa valley and speaks very highly of the eastern Oregon valley as a home country.

Edw. J. Kellogg, of Klamath Falls and formerly of Gold Hill was here the first of the week visiting relatives and looking over the mining situation in this district. He is employed in the lumber industry are looking with a wistful eye towards the southern Oregon gold and copper mines, and that if it proves true that this region really contains telluride gold ore that there will be a big rush here from Klamath Falls for investments in the mines and many timbermen experienced in mining in the southwestern states will seek this field to again take up mining.

It is reported that Marshfield and local people are incorporating a mining company to take over and develop a gold property situated near the Kelmar-Vanpet mine. That the gold mining industry in this district is on the verge of a general resumption is evidenced by the several reports of other Oregon towns which are assembling finances with a view to investing in the local mines, and the announcement that the Vernonia people who are interested in the Kelmar-Vanpet mine are financing the local smelter project.

Frank Bybee is building a new cattle corral and branding chute, which will be a great advantage to his cog business. Mr. Bybee is one of our prominent cattlemen.

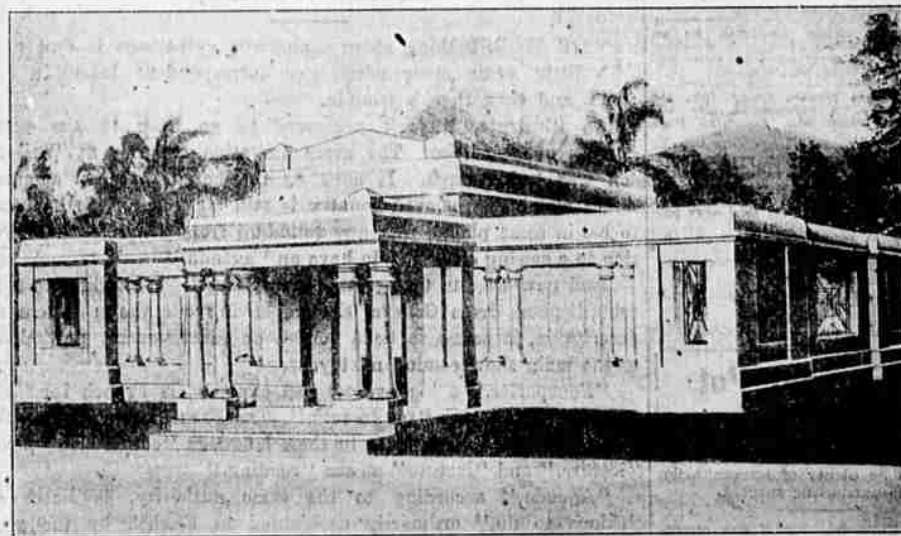
Nim Charley and Ona Comstock are busy clearing land. They expect to raise a big crop of potatoes next year.
