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FINAL PLEA FOR CLEMENCY FAILS, BOY FIGHTS ON

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—Sentenced to a firing squad on January 15, 1924, Ralph W. Seybold, spent last evening in his cell making a woman's beaded purse. The youthful murderer—he is 24 years old—yesterday heard the words pronouncing his doom uttered for the fifth time. He was convicted by a jury in the Utah district court April 1, 1924 for the murder of Patrolman David H. Crowther on October 23, 1923. Various court actions have carried the case along since that time.

Seybold expressed a hope that he might see his father and mother, who live at Defiance, Ohio, before he dies, but declared that he hardly thought that they would come here. He heard from his father frequently and last week when the warden of the penitentiary carried to him the news that the state board of pardons had been his last appeal for clemency, he also handed the condemned man a letter from his father.

"And it was only a two page letter when I expected eight pages," plaintively remarked Seybold. Seybold said he had a wife and baby at Westerville, Ohio, and that he had never heard from his wife, nor seen his child. Seybold was arrested at San Bernardino, Calif., several weeks after Crowther's body was found some distance west of this city. He was brought back, tried and convicted by a jury on April 1, 1924. On April fifth, sentence was first pronounced. June 4 was the date fixed.

An appeal to the supreme court automatically acted as a stay for Seybold. The case was argued and lost. On April 25, execution was set for May 29. On May 28 Governor George H. Dern granted a reprieve and on August 22, the board of pardons again refused to commute the sentence. For the third time, on August 28, Seybold heard the death sentence pronounced. This time the court named September 11. A writ of certiorari acted as another stay because less than thirty days separated the two dates and execution was again postponed to October 13. Acting Governor Crockett granted another reprieve enabling the board of pardons to review new evidence. For two days last week the board heard witnesses and read affidavits then refused further clemency. "I am not through fighting yet," said Seybold.

JAPAN PREMIER SAYS WAR WITH U. S. IMPOSSIBLE

TOKIO, Dec. 11.—(A. P.)—Premier Kato today discussed with the Associated Press the subjects of disarmament, sovietism, America and China, and declared Japan gladly would participate in any legitimate disarmament conference, but he believed the time was not ripe at present for such a conference to prove successful. The premier did not believe that Russia would enter such a conference and he also feared that certain European countries were not yet ready. The Japanese government head said Japan wanted the United States to participate in any such conference called.

So far as any future Japanese-American war was concerned, Premier Kato declared it to be an "absurdity and physically impracticable." He was sure Japan never would resort to war over the question of immigration, and anyway he hoped America some day would amend the immigration law insofar as it pertains to Japanese, thus removing the only sore spot.

The premier declared that the present policy of non-interference in Manchuria would be continued and that no Japanese troops would be sent further unless absolutely necessary. He said that at present about 5000 railway guards were moving toward Manchuria. He added that replacements would bring the force to approximately 7000, which at present is considered sufficient. The conditions in China and Manchuria were puzzling, the premier said. It was not known today what would happen tomorrow and Japan's future policy would be governed by conditions.

EX-HOSTLER OF COSSACKS NOW SHAH OF PERSIA

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—(A. P.)—From hostler in the stables of the Cossacks to shah of Persia has been the rise of Reza Khan Pehlevi.

From tender of the horses, Reza entered the Cossacks and in 1921 led the revolt which culminated in the removal of the shah and the assumption of the role of dictator. And now, according to news from Teheran, the capital of Persia, say that on December 14 Reza will ascend the throne. The dashing Reza, despite his humble origin, is possessed of both strategy and statecraft. As soon as he became premier and minister of war, in other words, dictator, he began the reorganization of the country. At first he desired a republic, but he was thwarted in his efforts to establish one by the priests. Then a national assembly proclaimed the deposition of the Kadjar dynasty and Reza is said to have immediately set his heart on ascending the throne. He brought about unification of the unruly tribes in a single entity and raised an army of 40,000 men. His men are equipped like any other modern army, having tanks, airplanes and wireless stations.

The new ruler of the Persians had little chance during his childhood to obtain even an elementary education and it has been rumored that as far as writing is concerned, he is only able to sign his name.

IRISH FREE STATE RATIFIES TREATY FIXING BOUNDARY

LONDON, Dec. 11.—(A. P.) The Irish boundary question which long has been an irritation to the people of Ireland and to the British government finally has been settled under the agreement reached in London a short time ago by which the old line dividing north and south Ireland remains intact and the Irish free state is absolved from paying Great Britain a large sum of money to aid in meeting Great Britain's war debts. The parliaments of Great Britain, the Free State and Ulster have adopted the agreement and King George on behalf of Great Britain has given the measure royal assent.

Ulster previously had ratified it and last night in Dublin the Dail Eireann gave its approval by a vote of 71 to 29 after four days of debate. At the final session of the Dail, President Cosgrave contended that the government for the first time had secured the good will of northern Ireland. It had done the best it could to settle the disturbing question in an amicable manner.

Samonn DeValera, leader of the republicans, remains unrecanted. Likewise the republican deputies of the Dail have expressed unalterable opposition to what they consider the partition of Ireland.
