TRAIL GUARDED BY U. S. TROOPS IS FIRED UPON

PEKING, Dec. 11.—(A. P.) Eight American passengers were on board the international train which left for Tientsin with a detachment of American infantry as a special guard. The train reaches Yangtsun this morning. Four miles to the south General Jehing-Ling's troops fired on it. The official report alleges that the Chinese feared an enemy ruse in the use of foreign flags to cover the approach of General Feng Yu-Hsiang's armored train. The train returned to Yangtsun where some of the passengers, trapped several miles and secured motor cars in which to proceed to Tientsin.
