P.)—Taking cognizance of criticism directed against it in testimony before the senate committee investigating the internal revenue bureau, Commissioner Blair of the bureau today issued a statement declaring the Gulf Oil corporation case was settled before the present administration came into power and before Secretary Mellon took office.

F. Carleton of Eugene, chairman of committee on information.

The representative council will meet on Tuesday, December 29, for the transaction of all business. On Wednesday morning the general assembly will meet to listen to addresses from Miss Mabel V. Wilson of the Seattle public schools, Dr. E. P. VanBerley of Stanford university, and Mrs. J. P. Hill, vice president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

P.)—Abu-El-Krim, Rifian chieftain and his entourage are encamped at Abu-Kemara in the Beni Urriaguel country about 15 miles from Ajadid, his former capital, which he abandoned before the advance of Spanish soldiers. He is reported to have approached some factions of the Beni Urriaguel and Beni Cocoya tribes for having facilitated the landing of the Spaniards at Alhucemas.

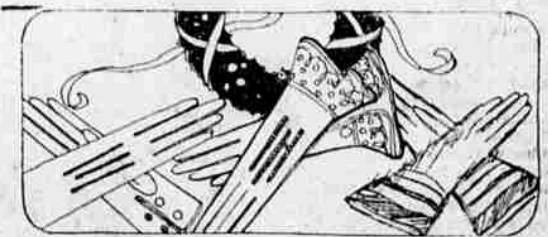

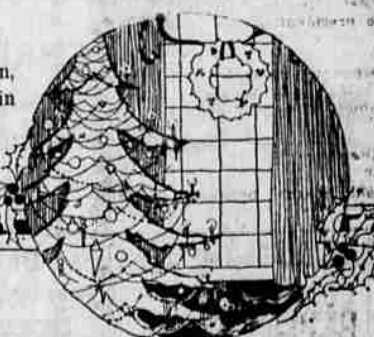
