HUSBAND HELD FOR MURDERING HIS YOUNG WIFE

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 15.—(AP)—

L. C. Bagwell, 35, was lodged in jail this morning in connection with the death of his wife who was murdered last night. The woman had been bound, gagged, and apparently strangled to death. Her husband said he discovered the body when he returned from Spokane to his ranch home on the edge of the city at about 2:30 last night. Mrs. Bagwell was 36 years old. Her two children, 5 and 11 years old, who slept in an adjoining room, were not awakened, officers were told, though their mother had been bound to her bed and killed. An investigation by Sheriff Floyd Brower and Coroner Barnhart, the husband was taken into custody. There were discrepancies in his story, the sheriff said, which would have to be cleared up. The sheriff declared that a doctor who examined the body doubted that death had been caused by the gag. The physician, Dr. J. Farrow, said it looked as though the gag had been placed in the woman's mouth after death, as it was not moist. Bagwell, who has a small place in Bigelow gulch, has been running a truck into Spokane.

EUGENE MOTORIST TO FIGHT STATE CHARGE

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 15.—(AP)—Charles Murray, indicted by a county grand jury here on a charge of involuntary manslaughter, entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned in circuit court late yesterday afternoon. His trial is expected to open within a few days. Murray was indicted as a result of an automobile accident last Sunday, when William Martin, a pedestrian, was killed by a car driven by Murray. Police officers have asserted that Murray was intoxicated at the time of the accident. Murray is held in the county jail in lieu of \$5000 bail.

BIG PLANE TO LAND AT EUGENE FOR THE PRESENT

Mainly due to the fact that the local airport is deemed unsuitable for their heavy 10-passenger planes, the West Coast Transit company will make Medford no longer a scheduled stop, according to reports received here today at the Hotel Jackson. Eugene will be the only stop in Oregon outside of Portland, according to W. M. Clementson, manager of the hotel. The West Coast Transit company had planned to construct an office building on the local field and install a gasoline supply tank, but due to the fact that last Monday the southbound ship was injured four times on the field, resulting in the removal of several of the passengers, who were forced to journey on to San Francisco by train, this equipment may all be installed at Eugene.

However, men are now engaged at the Medford field, making necessary improvements, and it is possible that the company may retain Medford as a re-fueling base, but no official information in regard to the situation has been received as yet. Yesterday's southbound ship landed at Eugene while en route to San Francisco.

STANDARD OIL HEAD PLEADS NOT GUILTY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, pleaded not guilty today to charges of violating the law in refusing to answer questions asked by the senate Teapot Dome committee.

The oil man was arraigned in the District of Columbia supreme court and his counsel asked for 20 days in which the defense might determine the method by which it will attack the indictment. Chief Justice Mc Coy granted the request and continued Stewart's bond of \$5,000.

JACKSON COUNTY SHOWS INCREASE IN 4-H CLUB WORK

Jackson county had 122 of the 10,154 members of the 4-H club in 1927, as shown in the report of H. C. Seymour, state club leader. The per cent of those completing their work in the state was 31.4 and in the county 34. This is an increase of 4.4 per cent in the state.

Sewing was the most popular project in both this county and the state. A total of 47 club members in the county were in seven sewing clubs and in the state 4177 club members were in 542 clubs. Dairy calf clubs were the largest livestock demonstration in the state with 645 members. Projects making outstanding increase in enrollments last year were swine 59 per cent and dairy calf 20 per cent. The quality of work was greatly increased in clothing, dairy herd record and rabbit work. The club staff, county agents, county school superintendents, department of public instruction and extension specialists have co-operated to bring about this increase.

Financially, club work done in the state had a value of \$188,744.99, a cost of \$20,082.66 and a profit of \$168,662.33. There were 1210 clubs organized with 2690 boys and 4164 girls. Club cash prizes given at state, county community fairs, and the Pacific International totaled \$46,317. Money for providing livestock was loaned to club members of the state by banks in a total of \$2000.
