

NEW GARBAGE SERVICE STARTS WITH 3 TRUCKS

The City Sanitary Service company with three new trucks this morning began operations under the recent contract made with the city of Medford and at noon, I. W. Phillips, president and general manager of the company, reported that the trucks had been running to capacity. He added that several weeks may elapse before the company will be entirely caught up with garbage collections, as for two months past refuse has been piling up in various sections of the city.

Approximately 70 per cent of Medford citizens will take advantage of the new garbage service, according to cards that have been returned to the company, which sent them out last week to ascertain how many would care to have regular collections of garbage made.

Preparations are now being made on arranging new routes to facilitate speedy collections and prompt attention. The new trucks of the company attracted considerable attention when they made their first appearance on the street today. The refuse and garbage from restaurants is placed in water tight tanks with two openings on the top and one at the rear for rapid unloading at the city dump yards, where equipment has been ready for some time to provide for its disposal.

NEW JACOBS STORE TO BE READY FOR SATURDAY OPENING

The new store will be managed by H. R. Jacobs, who will make his home in Medford, and the store will be known as "Mullins." L. Jacobs, who is the sole owner of the new establishment, will not make his home in Medford, according to present plans.

One week from tomorrow night the store will have an informal opening, with souvenirs given to all who attend and on the next day, Saturday, the store will be formally opened to business.

FORMER RESIDENT BARELY ESCAPED NEWHALL FLOOD

Lester Mann of Hollywood, Cal., barely escaped the devastating flood of late Monday night when the St. Francis dam broke and spilled out hundreds of lives, according to a report made when he arrived here yesterday for a visit with relatives at Central Point. He passed through Newhall, one of the hard hit towns, shortly before the flood waters raced through the streets, leaving death and ruin in their wake.

Mr. Mann said today that he was familiar with the entire section and had been on the dam several times shortly after it was completed. He described the beautiful Santa Clara valley and told of its acres of orange and citrus groves and choice farming land. He seemed to think the dam break was largely caused by frost and said he was convinced that it was no fault of the dam construction, saying its strength was so apparent that it left no question in his mind.

He described Newhall as being about the size of Central Point and being an up-to-date small city about 60 miles from Los Angeles. Mr. Mann, who has spent the past three years in Hollywood, reported conditions to be generally quiet, with the movie studios working at less than one-half capacity. He explained the slump in the moving picture production was due to an over production of pictures and the advent of a number of new producing companies. He plans to spend the summer in Medford and Central Point, where he has a number of relatives, and then return to his home in Hollywood, where he is interested in the trucking and transfer business.

Plucky High School Girl Plays Game With Broken Finger

"The play was the thing" with Miss Vivian Cook, plucky high school senior who dislocated a broken finger to finish out an indoor baseball game against the women's faculty team on the high school diamond last night. Taken to the Community hospital after the game, the girl was treated by Dr. R. W. Stearns, who claimed that the bone in the little finger of the left hand was badly splintered, necessitating the wearing of an arm sling for a few days.

The accident occurred in the course of the game last night when Miss Vivian went to tug a faculty member with the ball. Miss Maud Barrager, coach, gave first aid and suggested that Vivian drop out of the game. But a broken finger, so, didn't amount to much in the middle of an exciting contest, and Vivian suggested that the faculty members were trying to get rid of her anyway. So she kept on until the end.
