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STOP NEEDLESS SACRIFICE OF LIFE

ANOTHER airplane tragedy at sea, stresses the need of some definite system of control, which will eliminate the needless loss of life.
 "The time has passed when it can be truthfully said, that such accidents are a necessary 'waste' to the important business of airplane development."
 If Captain Hincheliffe and Miss Elsie MacKay have offered the fates of Nungesser and Goh, which seems almost certain,—we fail to see how their sacrifice will contribute anything of value to the science of aviation.
 If every precaution was taken, and if weather conditions were generally propitious, then the flight was justified. But from what we can glean from fragmentary reports, the flight was surrounded by secrecy because aviation experts in England were unanimous in their belief that the attempt at such a time was almost certain to end disastrously.
 We grant the necessity of risks in the development of aviation—nothing ventured nothing gained applies particularly to long distance flying,—but what we do not grant is that there is any necessity of allowing "stunt" flyers to go on uncontrolled, and pile up casualties needlessly,—merely on the gambling chance of getting some pleasurable publicity.
 Such a practice instead of benefiting aviation, in our opinion, injures it.

CHECK UP ON ALL DAMS AND RESERVOIRS

THE IMPORTANT thing in this frightful catastrophe at the St. Francisco dam is to determine its cause.
 There are many reservoirs and dams throughout the country, particularly in the West, and a similar break in any of them would cause tremendous property damage and probable loss of life.
 We believe the government and states should make a thorough investigation of all properties of this kind; if defects are found correct them, and if safeguards are needed, provide them.
 Municipalities, private companies, irrigation districts, can't be depended upon to do this. It is a public job, and the best experts the federal and state governments have should be placed on this service, at the earliest possible moment.
 Relief for the sufferers is necessary, and the governments will aid in this, wherever outside aid is needed. But the big thing is to render a repetition of such a disaster, as remote as human effort can provide. And the time to start on such preventive measures is now.

BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF DOCTOR FOSTER

Every literary authority has a finest biography all ready to pop when the question arises. I've glanced hastily through a score of the world's best biographies, and if any one should ever ask me I'd try to say casually in a twinkling of an eye, without a flourish or a flourish, "Cushing's Life of Foster." Not at all because Foster was a doctor, nor because Cushing is a doctor. Should any reader take this hint and read Cushing's Life of Foster and then confess that he is charmed by the biographer's style, we will cheerfully refund the cost of the book.
 The trouble with many biographies is that they have unwieldy titles without substance. Take Ludwig's Biograph, for instance; but be sure to take it in, for if you get involved in it before his Napoleon, you may conclude that Napoleon was just like that, and so miss Napoleon. Perhaps Napoleon's life was big enough to fill a hefty volume; but his was not, and Ludwig makes a terrible job of it, packing and padding the book up to the full size.
 Now my idea of a good biography is a story of a man's life told in the shortest possible way. For example, suppose you had a juicy contract with some publisher to write the Life of Foster. I think it could be issued complete in one volume to-wit: Doctor Foster at the height of his career surprised all his friends by suddenly withdrawing from a large and lucrative practice and moving to Gloucester. Through some trick of fate—or was it fortune?—you know, both were not being done at the time—it came on to rain about the time he started, and it kept up a steady downpour all the way. If the contract required it, we could work in six or eight chapters about climate, rainfall, crops, husbandry, the doctor's favorite dog, women, roads, fishing, neighbors, and the like, to my desired length. However, nothing came of it. The doctor survived and lived happily for long years. And so we leave him, surrounded by his great-grandchildren, an inseparable link in his, and several pinpoints of tobacco, scattered over his life.
 Mr. H. M. L. writes that he encounters tough arguments when he tries to "get things done" about immunity and the exposure business. He says the poor fisher that in my articles I am dealing with 100 per cent healthy birds and my arguments do not apply to a man who has what purports to be "central trouble" of some kind.
 My teachings apply to healthy folk, of course, but just the same hygiene is hygiene for sick or well, and immunity is immunity, and these birds with one lung all shot or something the purports to be "central" are sadly mistaken if they imagine what is good for a healthy person is not good for them. Mr. L. suggests that I have missed rather badly over one of the reasons for the popular notion that exposure causes "vert." He refers to the fact that persons with, say, chronic rhinitis, or sinusitis, or bronchitis, are more sensitive to the mechanical changes in circulation from drafts, sudden chilling, and the like. I have discussed that dozens of times. If I drag it in every time we touch the subject, a lot of the poor guys will get the notion that such "exposure" really is bad for them.
 Certainly, my nose will run, or my stuff will run on trifling exposures, if I have some chronic disease condition like rhinitis. But I do not mistake this temporary discomfort for an illness. That's all there is about it.

Answer—So far as I know, it may be true that 97 per cent of the caffeine has been removed from the brand of coffee you mention. Nevertheless, I believe I would agree with the remark you overheard the doctor make. I once tried a generous free sample of decaffeinated coffee or gathering of doctors. They were very polite, for doctors, and didn't say much, but I understood that when I tried some of the stuff myself. There is nothing much for one to say about it. "All bunk" is fair enough.

Answer—Well, here I am. Now if some other doctor will volunteer to join me, we'll endeavor to meet this situation. Seriously, friend, I can't name a doctor who understands it better or worse than I do. I tried to make that clear in the article you refer to. Submit your case to a good doctor.

 Our two children have the whooping cough. Do you think the medicine they give nowadays helps them from having it so bad? How many months do they have to have and what effect does it have on them and how long does whooping cough last?—Mrs. C. B.

 The charge of faulty construction of the dam came from Edward Hyatt, Jr., state engineer, after he had inspected the structure's ruins in San Francisco canyon.
 Construction Faulty
 But the state engineer did not care to fix any definite responsibility for the failure of the dam. He declined to express an opinion whether the collapse was due to engineering mistakes or to causes over which man had no control.
 "That," he said, "will have to be determined after a more thorough investigation than I had time to make."
 However, the state engineer declared there are many rumors of a more or less incriminating nature being passed from mouth to mouth among subordinates at the dam.
 "One of these," he said, "is that orders had come three or four days before the dam's collapse to empty the reservoir due to a fear of the structure's collapsing. I could not verify this report."
 Hyatt stated that his investigation showed abutments of the dam had been anchored in red conglomerate rock.
 "I found this very soft," remarked the engineer, "but whether that was the original state or had become so through the action of the rising water, I am unable to state."
 "The abutments went out and the rush of the flood waters also washed away a great area of the foundation."
 "There is no question in my mind that had the dam had sufficiently strong foundation this great tragedy never would have happened."

 General Motors reached a new record high of \$164 and closed at \$165.37 1/2, and advances of \$5 or more were numerous among other industrials and specialties.
NEW YORK, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Violent speculation for the advance was resumed in today's stock market with General Motors again in the forefront of the advance.
 More than a score of specialties were marked up on a series of drives against the short interest in those issues. Ralls assumed increasing prominence with six issues in new high ground for the year.
 General Motors, after absorbing a large amount of profit taking early in the week, rushed up seven points to a new peak at 164, with buying influenced by reports of increasing sales. Ralls held fairly steady around yesterday's final price of 156 during the early part of the session.
 The closing was strong. Profit taking sales made their appearance here and there in the final hour, but the main trend continued upward in investment shares assuming more prominence. American Can reached \$5, a new high, and jumps of 6 1/2 in American Express and 10 in Adams Express were registered. Goodyear fell four points to a new year's low, but General Motors continued to turn over between 163 and 164. Total sales approximated 3,400,000 shares.
