TRADER HORN IS GUEST OF HONOR AT N. YORK TEA

NEW YORK, Mar. 16.—(AP)—Alford Aloysius Smith (Trader Horn), who at the age of 15 left his peddling of pots and pans in South Africa to dictate a book which has been a best seller in this country for months, has a new slant on the Queen of Sheba which he expects to put into a book.

"The first beauty of her time was 'only a Malay lady out of Madagascar,'" says the old African trader, fighter and explorer, here to prove to a doubting America that such a person as the glamorous figure that stalks across the pages of Mrs. Etheldreda Lewis' book really exists.

He made his announcement at a tea given by the Literary Guild of America.

"She was a Malay lady, but came on of Malagassar to make her mark on men and history," he said. "I got it from the natives. They knew all about her and told it to me straight. I found good solid proof of it, and you can lay to that. Links up the old and the new. You have to go to Peru, then to India and back to Africa to tie it all up; but it's there—believe it's there. I told John Galesworthy about it and John Galesworthy said: 'Old man, you've got it, and I have.'"

Then, turning from the Queen of Sheba to Stanley, the African explorer, he said: "I paddle my own canoe. I carry my own gun. I discovered more than Stanley did. Stanley discovered Livingstone, but he knew he was there all the time; aye, he knew it."

The old bewhiskered man, who resembles portraits of Walt Whitman and Longfellow, is very bitter against Stanley and suggests darkly that the fate of some of Stanley's white assistants on the expedition was not entirely due to normal causes.

"That last 'un, that chap that was reported went over the falls. They say he did go over the falls."

Then squinting angrily—"Maybe so, he could have. The natives would tell you what happened. Unembarrassed as he stood knee deep in authors and literary critics at the tea, he showed scars on his arms and legs to prove the truth of some of his tales."

GAME COMMISSION INSTRUCTS COWGILL ON SPECIAL WORK

With the coming of the smelt run in the Sandy, the age-old controversy between the Sun Dial ranch and the Oregon state game commission over the proposal to divert the water of the stream into the Little Sandy became the principal bone of contention at the game commission meeting yesterday.

An offer by the owners of the ranch to take \$5000 for damages which they allege would result from construction of a dam across the main channel of the stream to divert the water into the small channel was heard by the commission.

After five hours of discussion, a program of five steps toward the ultimate end in view was planned. Attorney-General Van Winkle will be asked for opinions on legal questions involved; Commissioner Corrigan was asked to reach a decision with the ranch company, to be acted upon officially by the commission; Ralph Cowgill, Medford, engineer for the commission, was instructed to prepare plans for a dam and receive bids; Commissioner Miller was instructed to consult the fish commission of Oregon in regard to sharing expenses; and Harold Clifford, state game warden will at-

tend to obtaining a government permit for altering the course of the stream.

Later in the day Mr. Cowgill was employed by the commission on a 50-50 basis with the fish commission of Oregon to make a detailed study of various game and commercial fishing streams of Oregon, that the two commissions may have scientific expert basis upon which to make decisions on matters now pending. These concern power and water system dams, amounts and conditions of water in streams, and allied subjects.—Oregonian.

FUELLESS MOTOR TALK ALL BUNK

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16.—(AP)—An associate of Lester J. Hendershot, young inventor in a hospital here, now claims that the motor which the latter had evolved, is not "fuelless" at all.

"The nearest definition that I can give for the motor," says J. B. Barry Peat, business partner of the 29-year-old inventor, "is that it is uncanny in operation."

GLORIA'S HUSBAND SECURES PERMIT TO RETURN TO U. S.

PARIS, March 16.—(AP)—Difficulties encountered by Marquis Fainse de La Coudray, husband of Gloria Swanson, motion picture actress, in getting a visa to return to the United States have been smoothed over. They were merely a matter of American governmental regulations. The marquis will be permitted to sail on March 25.

The American consulate in Paris refused to grant him a visa on the grounds that he had already lived in America for a year, whereas his passport called for only six months. He proved, however, that he had fulfilled the requirements of the law since both he and his wife had asked for a six months' extension in New York, but the papers were sent to Hollywood, instead of New York.
