The Southern Oregon Normal school basketball tournament for secondary schools began on schedule today, with four games played this forenoon and six scheduled for this afternoon. The tournament will end tomorrow night when the final championship game will be played.

Results of games this forenoon are as follows: Powers 28, Glen Dale 21; Drain 21, Coos River 8; Chilton 22, Jacksonville 14.

Jacksonville was the only Jackson county team that played. However, Central Point, Talent, Rogue River and Phoenix were scheduled to play this afternoon, with the first named of the four teams given the edge to get into the finals tomorrow night.

The members of the 21 teams taking part in the tournament were given final instructions at the Lithia Springs hotel this morning at 8:20 a.m. at the hotel at noon today the coaches of the teams were guests at a luncheon with "Mac" McNeil, normal school coach, and W. P. Andrews, M. C. A. secretary, as the hosts. Cleone Caldwell, W. Spiers, F. Coleman and Fred Spear, members of the normal school basketball team, acting as referees and umpires for the tournament.
