OLDEST MAN IN MARATHON QUITS; NEWTON LEADING

(By Russell J. Newland, Associated Press Sports Writer.) SELIGMAN, Ariz., Mar. 15.—(AP)—The hardships of the 3400 mile cross country marathon, the thirteenth day of which the hundred odd foot racers faced today, have claimed one of the most interesting of the contestants.

Charles W. Hart, who has seen the passing of 53 summers in England, his native country, has succumbed after a bid that astonished all. He dropped by the wayside during the running of yesterday's stretch of the lengthy trek—the sturdy limbs that had carried him more than 400 miles in twelve days could go no further.

With Hart out of the race, Arthur Newton, the 40-year-old British runner entered from Rhoades, South Africa, became the oldest of the race.

At the start of today's lap Newton led the field by more than seven hours in the total elapsed time, taken to cover the 435.7 miles from Los Angeles. It has taken him 67 hours, 10 minutes and 30 seconds.

Newton finished second to Andrew Payne, sturdy-limbed Claremore, Okla., youth in yesterday's leg. Payne's time for the 35.3 mile stretch was 5:39:10 while Newton's was 5:47:30.

HANDY MANDY IS NOW FAVORITE FOR COFFROTH

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Mar. 15.—(AP)—Handy Mandy, great racing mare from the Three D stable, was today established by Tia Juana horsemen as the favorite in next Sunday's Coffroth handicap, the country's richest turf stake, after an announcement yesterday by Dan Riddle, trainer of Justice F., hitherto the reigning choice, that the Daniels horse had come out of a race Wednesday with a lame foreleg that may prevent him going to the post day after tomorrow.
