If Benjamin Franklin were here today, he would smile and be happy in the thought that America has become a fifty nation America. It is one of the world leaders in saving. Perhaps the best point about our system is that banking is not restricted to the adults only. In the olden days the banks were few and very far apart, and it was considered as a novelty for an adult to bank, and much more so for a child. My grandfather recalls the day when he would climb upon a chair and put every extra penny in a huge mug, which rested on the mantle. But now, every child from the first grade through high school, has the privilege of depositing his money in a real savings bank.

Every Tuesday is bank day, on which day the pupils bring their extra "pocket-money" and deposit it in the school saving system. The cashier in each room takes the deposit and registers it in the student's bank book. Then the money is counted, the books checked, and the money sent to the bank. By this way of saving, a child during his school years is able to save enough money upon which to attend college. But college is not the aim of every student.
